Dear Little Chapel on the Boardwalk family,

I hope you will be sure and join us for our Holy Week and Easter services coming up in April.

On Palm Sunday, April 14, we will begin the 10:30 service with a procession of Palms which will begin at the Matthew House and move into the sanctuary. Our children will be leading us with our choir following them and the rest of the congregation to follow. What a joyous way to begin our Palm Sunday service.

Following the 10:30 service everyone is invited for a Pizza lunch and Easter egg stuffing event in the fellowship hall. After lunch we have over a thousand plastic Easter eggs to stuff that will be used at our annual Easter egg hunt on Saturday, April 20. The Easter

egg hunt will begin at 10:30 and is open to the community. In addition to all the eggs which will be hunted, there will be a puppet show for children of all ages.

On Maundy Thursday we will have our annual Tenebrae and Communion service at 7:00 p.m. "Tenebre" is a Latin word meaning "shadows" or "darkness" and this service features a series of seven lessons retracing the last actions of Jesus during his earthly life.

As each of the lessons are read, a candle is extinguished and the lights of the sanctuary are dimmed. Eventually, the church will be completely dark and the chancel area free from all external objects except for one lit candle that will remain on the communion table which signifies the hope of the Resurrection.

This is a very meaningful and powerful worship service that includes scripture, music, light and darkness and Holy Communion.

On Good Friday we will have a special service at noon. The Passion of Jesus Christ according to the Gospel of John will be chanted by three different people. This has become an annual service at

Little Chapel and will give you a great deal to ponder as we begin in earnest to think about Christ's death for us on the cross.

On Easter Sunday we will be celebrating the Resurrection of Christ with a glorious service at 10:30. Not only will there be wonderful music from our choir, but the bell choir will be playing as well. Be sure and arrive early as parking places will be at a premium. If possible, let me suggest you carpool with family and friends.

This is the most important time of the year in the life of the church and I hope you will make plans to be with us as we remember Christ's triumphal entry into Jerusalem, his suffering on Thursday and Friday and his glorious resurrection on Sunday!

MATTHEW HOUSE REOPENS!

Last September Hurricane Florence found the Matthew House causing major damage, including the entire roof and some walls and ceilings. After weeks of renovation work, the roof has been replaced, walls and ceilings have been repaired, new flooring has been laid and the walls have a cheerful, fresh coat of beachy, aqua paint. And, thanks to Brett Blizzard's generous donation, we have attractive, new ceiling light fixtures.

We are grateful to those who pitched in to help restore the Matthew House. Our special thanks to Dan Holt, Gary Gischel and John Moore, who spent many hours moving furniture, rehanging mirrors, painting and much more.

And, we are excited to be able to, once again, open the doors of the Matthew House for traveling mission groups. During the month of March three college groups stayed in the Matthew House during their Alternative Spring Breaks. They partnered with a wide variety of service organizations, including Access Fit, a group fitness program for children and adults with disabilities; Good Shepherd, and WARM (Wilmington Area Rebuilding Ministry).

So far, fifteen groups are scheduled to stay in House Matthew this vear. participating mission work in in our surrounding area. Most groups will be repairing homes with WARM, providing many of our low-income neighbors, many of whom are elderly or disabled, a safe home in which to continue living.

Recently, the Matthew House became a host site for Presbyterian Disaster Assistance providing housing for groups who want to help with hurricane relief. The first PDA group will be staying with us in May, and we are hoping more will choose to do so during the coming months.



Over these past seven years the Matthew House has provided housing for over 630 missionaries from 65 traveling mission groups, who have come to the Wilmington area to serve our neighbors in need.

The Matthew House also welcomes for three weeks in June, five groups of about ten children and teens each from the Crossnore School. Being near the ocean provides a time for them to put away their cares for a while and enjoy a few fun days at the beach.

You may wonder why we call Little Chapel's mission house "Matthew House". When the house opened seven years ago, the Mission Committee decided to rename 14 West "The Matthew House" because of the familiar words of Jesus spoken to his disciples:

"I was hungry, and you fed me,
I was thirsty and you gave me drink
I was homeless and you gave me a room,
I was shivering and you gave me clothes,
I was sick and you stopped to visit,
I was in prison and you came to see me."

March Meeting Highlights

The Session approved the Lenten and Holy Week plans for worship as planned by the worship committee. Holy Week services will include a time for reflection in the sanctuary at Noon on Monday, Tuesday, and Wednesday, April 15-17; Maundy Thursday service at 7 pm on April 18, with communion; and Good Friday Service at Noon on April 19.

On Easter Sunday, April 21, there will be one worship service at 10:30 am.

On Sunday, April 28, we will have one worship service at 10:30 am followed by a luncheon for the congregation. This is the week before the beginning of the beach service season and we want to celebrate our unity in Christ, even though some prefer the early service while others prefer to attend the later worship service. We strive to bring these two groups together for fellowship and worship as appropriate.

The Session met for a called meeting March 3 to approve the 2019 budget for LCOB. This budget is included in this newsletter and questions can be directed to session members or finance co-moderators, John Copeland and Al Wordsworth.

Elder John Copeland reported on the East Community Gathering of Presbytery Meeting, January 26, 2019, which he attended as LCOB Commissioner. The key note speaker was our new Presbytery General Presbyter/Stated Clerk Jerrod Lowry who shared his vision for our Presbytery.

The Property Committee has been busy working with contractors and our insurance adjuster as damage from Hurricane Florence

is still being examined and remediated. Most of the roof for the church building must be replaced. Repairs to the Matthew House have been completed and we are now hosting mission groups here to work on various mission projects in the area. Much thanks to Jim Martz for overseeing the Matthew House repairs and for working closely with insurance adjusters for general church repairs.


Plans are being formulated for creation of a Security Team for LCOB. Volunteers are welcomed; contact Pastor Pat.

We've been able to move out the round tables to provide more room in the narthex for folks to gather and socialize before and after worship. THANKS to everyone who helped get this project off the ground and to 'Kids Making It' for turning an idea into a great communication vehicle we are all very proud of.

Worship Committee

(This is the third in a series of features about the committees at Little Chapel. Janice Allen and Sherry Lovette, co-moderators, answered these questions to give us deeper insight into the mission and workings of the worship committee.)



Q. The committee's mission or purpose is to 'oversee all aspects of the worship life of Little Chapel.' That seems to be an enormous undertaking. How do you embrace 'all aspects of the worship life?'

It is an enormous Janice: undertaking and yes, there are many aspects of worship that this committee deals with. We meet once a month to plan the activities of the worship church. This is done with the help of the pastor and the music and a director of representative from ten committees.

The Worship Committee makes recommendations to the session for approval concerning the worship life of the church.

You will see from the details in the other answers how many people are involved to be able to plan and carry out meaningful worship services to praise the Lord and magnify his name, and to enhance each member of the congregation's life and their relationship with God.


Sherry: As a new member of the committee, I can say it has been a 'hit the ground running' experience. The detail involved in the requirements for this committee are impressive. All efforts toward our worship and the aspects services involved are to provide an environment for congregation to enhance their personal relationship with God and our belief bond with each other.

Q. How many church members are actively involved in serving on the committee? Do they have standing assignments or how do you divide the work? How far in advance do you plan?

Janice & Sherry: There are ten people representing ten different committees within the worship committee plus David Heinzman & Pastor Pat.

Some of these committees have sub committees under them.

These ten committees are: communion and Paraments; flowers; children's messages and pew racks; liturgists; ushers; acolytes; weddings; funerals; communication.



Under the communion committee you have the communion prep committee and the communion clean-up committee.

The vice moderator of the **Worship Committee serves as** chairman of the communion committee. She secures the communion and traveling communion servers and oversees the serving schedule. On the communion committee alone, you have eight people.

The usher committee has an usher captain who serves on the Worship Committee and then twelve-monthly captains and four ushers each Sunday plus ushers for special services.

The flower committee has five people on it with the chairman serving on the Worship Committee.

We plan a year in advance for communion and Christmas and always several months in advance for Easter. Then there are special programs during the year that are planned as they come up. Considering the volume of work required, the committee does an incredible job.



Q. What does 'Worship life' mean to you?

Sherry: I think 'Worship Life' is akin to lifestyle. Because the committee's dedication provide an exceptional environment for our worship, we each are able to continually gain encouragement and focus to follow God's will for our We also coordinate with the Q. What role does Pastor Pat lives.

Janice: Worship life continual not just when I am in Church. Sunday worship and other worship services can be used to recap my life for the last week and serve as a prelude to my life for the coming week. I try to always worship God as he would have me to and ask for forgiveness when I fail. My church worship life helps me to do this.




Q. How does the committee select and train acolytes and ushers?




Do the seasons of Q. Christmas and Easter require vou as moderators to interact your differently with committee, the pastor, and staff?

In the fall of 2018, Hurricane Florence had devastating effects in NC and SC. Some of us and our friends were affected. "Presbyterian Disaster Assistance reached out to Presbyteries in the path of Hurricane Florence in the days before Florence made landfall," said Jim Kirk, associate for disaster response in the U.S. for Presbyterian Disaster Assistance.

PDA (Presbytery Disaster Assistance) will continue to partner with the impacted presbyteries, congregations, and communities throughout the short-term and long-term response.

Our collection will be divided equally between OGHS and Good Shepherd. Good Shepherd serves our local community. Good Shepherd's Mission is to feed the hungry, shelter the homeless, and foster transition to housing.

Last year alone, 238 individuals, including 46 families with children, were moved from homelessness to affordable housing.

Peacemaking Scholarship



Graduating High School Seniors & Rising College Sophomores

3-\$1,000 and 3-\$500 Scholarships (see below)

The Peacemaking Committee of Coastal Carolina Presbytery will offer three \$1,000 scholarships to high school seniors enrolling in college by the fall of 2019 and three \$500 scholarships to rising college sophomores.

Rules for Scholarship Consideration:

- 1. The student must be a graduating senior in high school or a rising college sophomore. The student must be active in a Presbyterian Church in Coastal Carolina Presbytery.

- 5. All essays must be received by 6 p.m. on Monday, April 29. *Email submission is preferred.*
- 6. The winners will be notified then presented with the award at a community presbytery meeting in June.
