There will be a Called Congregational Meeting on Sunday, April 15 after the 10:30 AM Worship Service to (1) approve the Pastor's Terms of Call for 2018 and (2) approve proposed changes in the Endowment Fund Description.

The Session continues to explore avenues to cut expenditures in 2018. In an effort to increase income, the Endowment Committee will present proposals for changes to the congregation.

The Finance Committee has met recently with our insurance agent, Robert McIver, to review our insurance coverage, especially with regards to coverage from possible hurricane damage.

The Christian Education Committee is working, along with Angela McConnell, Director of Children's Ministry, on the Easter Egg Hunt, scheduled for Saturday, March 31, and Vacation Bible School, scheduled for June 25-28.

The Personnel and Planning Committee is in the process of interviewing applicants for two open positions for nursery attendant.

The Worship Committee plans for Holy Week include noonday services on Monday, Tuesday, Wednesday and Friday, March 26, 27, 28 and 30, at 12:00 Noon and a Maundy Thursday service, March 29 at 7:00 PM. Communion will be celebrated at the Maundy Thursday service.

On Sunday, April 8, communion will be celebrated at both worship services and traveling communion is also scheduled on that date.

The Worship Committee has updated our guidelines for worship liturgists and these will be distributed to those participating.

Our Director of Adult Ministries, Susan Osteen, has been meeting with an ad hoc committee to formulate a philosophy and program. Several different programs are scheduled for the upcoming months.

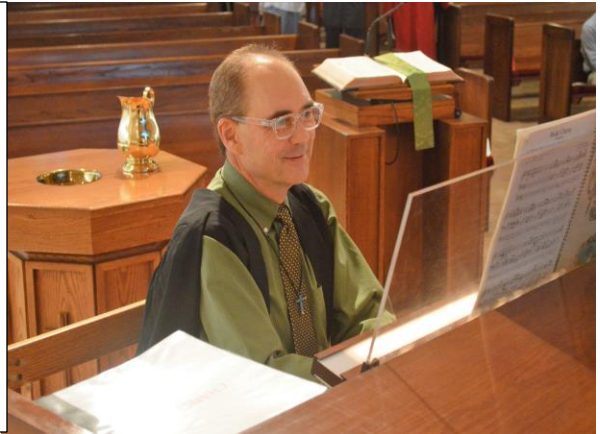
The Memorial Brick Project is underway, with Jim Smith, Jim Bolick and Jim Alexander coordinating the details.

APRIL'S STAFF SPOTLIGHT SHINES

ON

David Heinzman

Director of Music Ministries



Q. The Music Ministry at Little Chapel is an important and essential part of our fabric. Explain what that means to you and tell us how you integrate music into worship and the life of our church.

David: I have been a church musician since the age of 14, which is a long time! It is impossible to separate my life and my music. My "job" at the church is really my ministry - what I can give back to God for what He has given me. The planning and execution of music stems from that philosophy and multiple elements, such as Liturgical Season and musical forces available in the church.

Q. Over the years, you've taught, written, conducted, arranged, performed...what gives you the greatest pleasure with music?

David: The greatest pleasure for me is to discover and nurture new and existing talent, especially in the church environment. Then, to "plug-in" this talent, whether in choir, solo or ensemble venues is so rewarding!

Q. Of all the instruments you play, which is your favorite and why? Is there one that is particularly challenging or was the toughest to master?

David: My first love is the organ. Ask my parents about the way I nearly drove them crazy as an adolescent and teenager! Everything was ORGAN. It all started when my Dad took me to see our new church under construction in Michigan over 40 years ago. They were installing these tube - like things in the balcony - it was a pipe organ and I knew immediately that I had to be a part of that! In 1976, our family vacation was in Boston, just so I could play a famous organ at the Busch-Resinger Museum in Cambridge. As a teenager I built a harpsichord - it all came naturally.



Q. If music is your #1 passion, what is your second?

David: My second passion is learning - I like to explore and learn. The internet is so wonderful for this. When you quit learning, you wither.

Q. Of all the music genres, which is your favorite and why? Is there any musical style you just can't stand?

David: Truthfully, I like all kinds of music, except RAP - just can't get into it!

Q. If you could rewind your life and script it differently, what would you change?

David: The only thing I would change is that I would have completed my D.M.A. degree - I invested 70 + post-grad hours and then got discouraged near the end.



Q. When you need to relax and escape the rigors of the day, what do you do?

David: While there is little time for relaxation, I do like to walk on our beach. Also, cooking for my family is a form of relaxation for me.



Q. What is your favorite food? Anything non-vegetarian; *Q. Favorite movie?* So many - Sunset Boulevard; *Q. Male singer?* Pavarotti; *Q. Female singer?* Sorry, don't have one; *Q. Sports team?* Again, don't have one, and around here it's not good to answer that question!

Q. What is your favorite vacation spot? Is there one place on earth where you haven't been that you would like to visit?

David: I have been to Hawaii twice and that is a favorite. Australia is on my bucket list.

Q. What would you like people to know about you that only a few people know?

David: Perhaps to know that I do painting (acrylics, not houses).

The Migrant Ministry is an important phase of the Church Women United Outreach. Each year, health kits and duffle bags are assembled by member churches to be used by North Carolina's migrant workers.

Soap, Toothpaste, Dental Floss, Band-Aids, Towel, Safety Pins, Shampoo, Washcloth, Hand Cream, Nail File, Deodorant, Comb & Brush, Plastic Soap Dish, Disposable Razor, Toothbrush in a Container

Place items in a duffle bag 18" x 36" made of strong material with a drawstring at the top. Bags are available in the mission office room 116. Kits should be returned to the church by **MAY 1**. They will be presented at the Church Women United Friendship Day Service on **May 4**. Please leave completed bags on the benches in the Narthex or in room 116.

Thanks for your support of this important Christian outreach project, which is much appreciated by our migrant population.



This year the Birthday Offering will go to three recipients. Two of the recipients are located right here in the US. A brief description of each program follows:

1. The first is The Cottage Village, located in Cottage Grove, Oregon. This group plans to use the grant to build 13 tiny houses, thus creating a structured social community for individuals and families with very low incomes. With a centrally shared use area, these vulnerable rural citizens will have a protected environment in which to live.
2. The Dwelling Place in Minneapolis and St. Paul, Minnesota was established in 1998 as a support service for women and children as they escaped violent home situations. The grant will help purchase a vacant lot to build a multi-use facility at one location for group programming, case management, safe living spaces and staff offices.
3. The third recipient is the Village of Grace Center for Physical and Spiritual Health, located in Tegucigalpa, Honduras. This grant will enable the Presbytery of Honduras to purchase this retreat center in order to host international workshops, retreats and mission teams. The Presbyterian Women of Honduras will manage the facility.

The Scripture being used to further the importance of this offering is taken from Hebrews 4:16 (NKJV). It says:

“Let us therefore come boldly to the throne of grace, that we may obtain mercy and find grace to help in time of need.”

Church Safety and Security Training

Active shooter or mass homicide incidents can occur anywhere and unfold very quickly. The best way to survive such an incident is to prepare beforehand so you can react quickly and decisively.

In the 21st Century, the threat that exists for us all in the form of an 'active shooter', 'mass homicide', or 'terrorist incident' is as real as a fire emergency or natural disaster. Should you not be just as prepared? When the incident is occurring is not the time to begin thinking about how you are going to react and survive.

On April 11, 2018, at 7 pm, Little Chapel on the Boardwalk will host a presentation by Sgt. Warren Kennedy who will present an engaging presentation on how to be better prepared and able to quickly react should they encounter an 'active shooter', 'mass homicide', or 'terrorist incident'.

In an energetic and engaging 90-minute presentation, Warren brings over 30 years of practical, street experience. He will frankly, and honestly, discuss suggestions that will get those in attendance thinking before an incident takes place.



Warren, a graduate of East Duplin High School, is a life-long resident of eastern North Carolina. He holds an AAS degree in Criminal Justice Technology from James Sprunt Community College, a BIS degree in Criminal Justice from the University of North Carolina at Pembroke and is a graduate of the prestigious IACP *Leadership in Police Organizations* program. He served as a full-time sworn law enforcement officer in eastern North Carolina from 1986-2016; serving 17 of those years as a supervisor. He has been a certified law enforcement instructor since 1991, with specialty instructor certifications in Explosives & Haz-Mat; Rapid Deployment; Response to WMD Incidents; State & Local Anti-Terrorism; and CPR/AED. His instructor certifications are from the NC Criminal Justice Standards Division and the NC ARRE, regularly instructs in the area of Report Writing, Active Shooter Response, Patrol Techniques, Explosives & Haz-Mat, First-Line Supervision, Human Trafficking, and Crime Scene Preservation. His audiences include law enforcement officials, security officers, military personnel, and private citizens as his topics and delivery resonates across all social, racial, economic and professional backgrounds. Our second stop is **A Safe Place**, an organization that works to create a world free from commercial exploitation and human trafficking through community partnerships, empowerment, and opportunity.

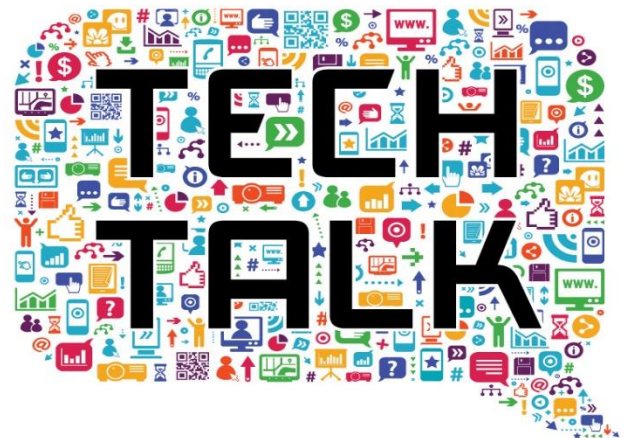

FROM THE GROUND UP

February 26 was a chilly but sunny day, a great day to break ground on the 2018 Habitat for Humanity Ecumenical Build. Little Chapel volunteers worked with members of 5 other churches (St. Therese Catholic, First Baptist, Masonboro Baptist, First Presbyterian, and Holy Cross Episcopal) at 1901 Lingo Street to bring life to the dream of home ownership for a loving mother and her two daughters.

By day's end, the foundation was dug, rebar was set, and everyone felt tired but awesome. During the next week, concrete block was laid and the foundation was poured, ready for our next adventure.

When the team from LCOB arrived on Saturday, March 3, we got to dig again, leveling the crawl space prior to adding the actual floor system. That went quickly with a large number of volunteers, and soon people were carrying and nailing huge floor joists into place. After what seemed like an unending number of joists, volunteers nailed plywood to the new flooring supports. Now it was ready for the next step. The LCOB Food Network put on a generous buffet for the grateful builders and received rave reviews.

The traditional Amish Barn Raising had nothing on the Habitat volunteers on March 10! Walls were framed on the floor and carried into place. By 10 a.m., three LCOB volunteers joined two dozen from other churches, and up went the walls! Once all four sides were raised and joined, interior walls were positioned and nailed into place. The next move was to add sheathing to enclose the building. At 2 p.m., the build looked officially like a house!

Two work days remain for Little Chapel volunteers. All of the positions for the May 5 painting day are filled, but we still need three more folks to caulk baseboards, and add doorstops, towel bars, doorknobs, and window blinds on May 12. Instruction is provided as needed, and for many of us, it is definitely needed! After that workday, other churches will do landscape work and cleanup. The dedication will be sometime in June, and everyone will be invited. Watch the weekly bulletin for the date and time. And check out the posters that appear after each work day. See your friends on a mission!

LEARNING MORE ABOUT OUR GRANT RECIPIENTS

National Alliance on Mental Illness

This mental health counseling center serves both the mentally ill and their families in the Wilmington area.

Their small grant request was to fund a twelve-week class for families, partners, and friends of individuals with mental illness. The course was designed to facilitate a better understanding of mental illness, increase coping skills, and empower participants to become advocates for their family members. This course is designated as an evidence-based program. It is available to residents in New Hanover, Pender, and Brunswick counties.

NAMI is a good example of a not large nonprofit that would fly under the radar of big charitable foundations, while being a group that is so deserving of help.

Team First Book – New Hanover County

The single mission of this nonprofit is to give children from low income families the opportunity to read and own their own NEW books. Teachers/tutors order from thousands of books available from their online marketplace. Children then choose their own books from among the teachers' options. These are incorporated into program lessons and then given to the children to take home and keep. Children who choose their own books are shown to have increased interest in reading.

Their purpose is to reduce the access gap to books which is the root of most youth illiteracy - lack of books in the home.

This is a wonderful program that goes on quietly in our community, a program that shows young children that there is a wider world out there.

Look at the fine work you all are doing through our endowment!

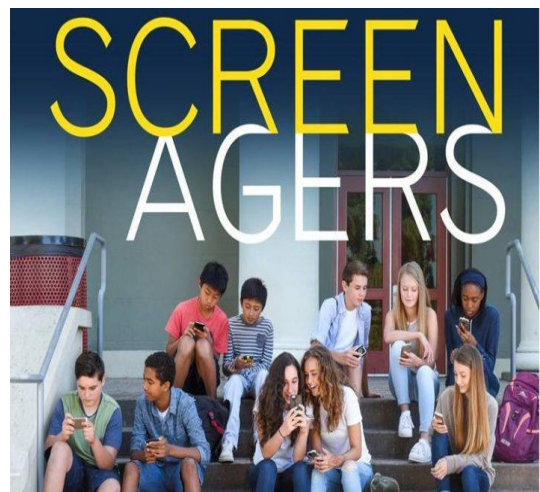

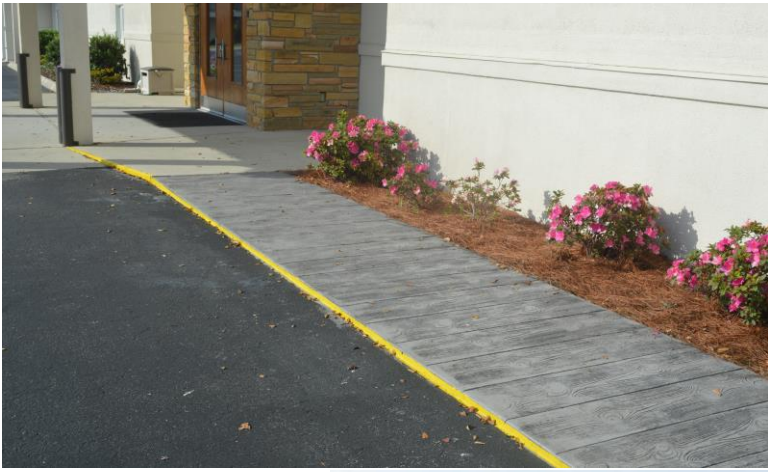

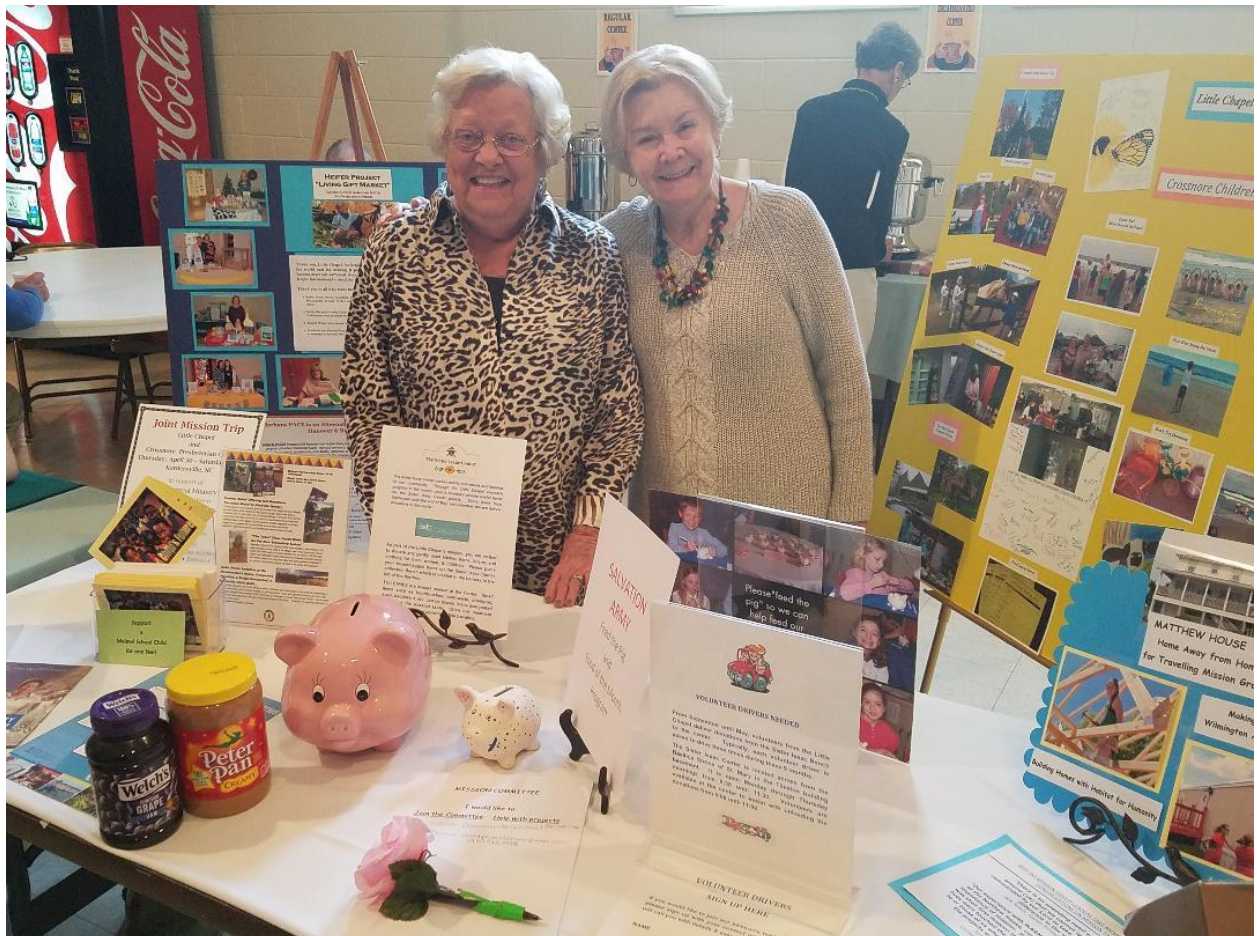
