the as I enjoy it, I, like many pastors have preached sermons warning that the commercialization of **Christmas** times can at overshadow the true meaning.




Phyllis Warren – Fellowship Committee

PIZZA, COOKIES & CAROLING


There will be a FREE pizza lunch in the fellowship hall following the 10:30 worship service on December 8.

LITTLE CHAPEL OFFICERS RETREAT

The church officers, elders and deacons, met for a planning retreat on Saturday, November 16, 2019 at the manse, 9:00 AM - 2:30 PM. This meeting included outgoing as well as newly elected elders and deacons and provided an opportunity for our new officers to hear opinions and experiences from outgoing officers. There were twenty-six officers present, including Pastor Pat. This retreat replaced the November session meeting.



After opening the meeting with prayer and devotions based on unity in the church, the body of Christ, all in attendance introduced themselves, citing what specifically brought each person to this church. The common theme that emerged from this discussion was the fact that Little Chapel embodies warmth and compassion as we nurture our members, embracing and supporting each person with the love of Christ as we work together to bring the message of God's salvation to our members and the community at large.

Pastor Pat then had the group read an excerpt from Sailboat Church by Dr. Joan Gray, which described a situation in a rural area in Nebraska in which economic and social patterns had changed and the church was being forced to seek new ways to worship and serve God.

In small groups the officers discussed how this situation could be applied to Little Chapel. The question posed was "What is God calling us to do at 2 W. Fayetteville Street?" This question emerged as the central theme for the day.

Continuing this theme, our small groups then reviewed results from the last Officers Retreat, January 2019. The categories were (1) strengths of

LCOB, (2) areas to improve, (3) how to enhance the ministry of LCOB, (4) initiatives for next 3-5 years. Specific ideas were discussed and recorded by the group at large. Many different options were explored.



After lunch, Pastor Pat led a discussion of duties and responsibilities for church officers, including a review of the Constitutional Questions for the Installation Service for church elders and deacons. Various responsibilities specific to our church, such as serving traveling communion, were explored and questions relating to officers' duties were answered.

To conclude the retreat, Pastor Pat led the group in the sacrament of holy communion. As the group had spent the day reflecting on the mission of the church and God's will for LCOB, participation in communion reminded officers of the spiritual bond of brothers and sisters in Christ as we strive to serve Him in this church and community.




