Dear Little Chapel on the Boardwalk family,

In the many places where I have served as Pastor, Associate Pastor, and Youth Director; during the summer things really slow down.

I have served in places where Bible studies stop, where Sunday school is cancelled, where worship services get combined. I was even in a church where the choir took the whole summer off, not just one month but the whole summer.



In most places the summer is not the best time to start a new program...at least not if you want people to attend.

But, being here at Little Chapel, things are different. Oh, the attendance at our "inside" service at 10:30 is lower, but that is more than made up for by our beach service.

So far this summer we have averaged 120 worshippers at our 8 am service at access #4. I tell everyone who asks me about our beach service that it took great vision for Little Chapel 10 years ago to start this service. It took a leap of faith and a willingness to try something new. And it has worked.

It's worked not only in how it has increased our attendance, it has worked in how it has been a meaningful experience for those who worship at that service; especially the visitors. I have heard many people who are here on vacation express their appreciation that Little Chapel has that service.

On more than one occasion I have had a woman come up to me and say that the beach service is the only service her husband will attend. That when they go back home he won't go to church, but he will come to the beach service.

Maybe it is the shortness of the service, maybe it's being outside, maybe it's the informality...maybe it's a combination of all those things, but the ministry, the outreach the beach service provides can't be measured in numbers really; it is measured in how it affects people.

The beach service does draw many visitors, some who are simply visiting for the week, some worship at other churches in Wilmington and like to get away from their own church for a Sunday or two and worship at the beach.



In an attempt to be able to answer questions visitors have, we are attempting to help Little Chapel members stand out from the rest of the crowd. We now have visors for Little Chapel members to wear that will identify them as members of the church and thus allows a visitor to seek them out if they want to ask a question about the church.

If you would like to have a visor, they will be available at the beach service. This will help Little Chapel folks to be more visible.



In 1990, volunteers realized that some of the clients they served during the week were going hungry on weekends, holidays, and other days that the New Hanover County Home Delivered Meals Program did not operate. These individuals, local churches, restaurants, and the New Hanover County Department of Aging banded together to meet the need and developed Weekend Meals on Wheels.

It was one of the first programs of its kind in North Carolina.

NEWS FROM THE WORSHIP COMMITTEE

The Worship Committee met Monday, June 11 in the Library.

The Worship Committee is responsible for all worship services. Changes made to the format of any service must be approved by the committee. Some changes must be approved by the Session.

At the June meeting it was discussed that members who sign up to be communion servers are not always finding a replacement to take their place if they are not fulfilling their duties for the time they are to serve. If you are to serve, please be on time or find your replacement and notify the communion chairman. Be responsible also if you are taking traveling communion. There will be no communion in July.

Flower signup sheet for a special Sunday must have a pink sheet presented to Delores to have names placed in the Sunday bulletin. This is filled out in order for Delores to have the needed information and must be paid for at that time. Each basket is \$60.

The volume of the chiming of the hour for the service to begin and at the end of the service is not heard through the church; therefore David will be asked to play the chiming of the hour on the organ. This is standard practice in most churches.

The choir is now on their summer schedule - June and July; and no rehearsal on Thursday nights. Rehearsal is on Sunday morning at 9:45 AM in choir room. No choir in August. Special music and favorite hymns. Easy music planned. Please come and sing with us this summer.

Acolytes do not serve during the summer months. There will be a new training class beginning in September. Only children who are entering into the sixth grade and older will be eligible to become acolytes. Watch for more information in the fall.

All of these duties and many details are required each week and at funerals and weddings to have meaningful services at LCOB.

There will not be a worship committee meeting in July but will resume the second Monday in August.

JULY'S STAFF SPOTLIGHT SHINES ON

SUSAN OSTEEN

DIRECTOR OF ADULT MINISTRIES

Q. You have been our Director of Adult Ministries for 6 months. Tell us what you've learned about Little Chapel and its members.

A. Little Chapel is a unique church because of its location on Wrightsville Beach. Just like the beach, it is ever changing to adapt to the faith needs of its congregation. Leadership and members are not hesitant to try something new. Congregation members are actively involved in many aspects of church life, and it is vital and alive because of that. Little Chapel has created community for so many members, that is what I like best about the church.



Q. Since Little Chapel did not have an adult ministries program, you were asked to help create one. Tell us about that.

A. I will admit that is has been a challenge to create a new program here at Little Chapel because of the many possibilities that exist for adult ministry. And this program is never going to be "done" being developed. It will be a fluid, ever changing process as it grows. However, I feel it is important to lay a solid foundation for adult ministries so that whatever is built will continue to exist into the future.

Q. What is your vision for the adult ministry?

A. My vision of adult ministry is to minister to the relational needs of the church congregation. Those needs can be addressed in many ways including; prayer and worship activities, meetings, events, trips, programs, and other areas where Adult Ministries can be of assistance. Adult ministry needs to serve as a vehicle for interaction among the people of this congregation.

Since Little Chapel already has very active spiritual and service opportunities, I have chosen to focus on learning opportunities & socialization. And the congregation will continue to see more of that in the next couple of months. I want to provide many opportunities for congregational members to come together in what interests them.

I am asking the congregation to fill out a new survey to help me determine needs and wants of congregational members so that what is offered is what people want. It will be mailed directly to members' homes and I am asking for honest and open feedback.

Q. You've were a parish nurse for 12 years. Tell us about that.

A. Parish Nursing is an opportunity for a church to have an established health ministry. I would love to see this type of program developed at Little Chapel to continue to meet the needs of the congregation.



A parish nurse is a registered nurse (RN)specialist who encourages physical and spiritual health and wholeness by developing and leading programs within faith communities. Some possibilities for a health ministry included:

Health education and teaching

Personal health counseling for faith community members

Coordinating with community health resources and acting as a church liaison

Training and coordinating volunteers in support services

Organizing health support groups

Assessing congregational and community health needs

Responding to health-related issues such as substance abuse, addictions and violence within congregational families or the surrounding community

Q. You were the founder for SHARDS and Little Lambs Day Care & Learning Center. How did that come about and are those 2 organizations still in operation today?

A. Both organizations came about because of need and I am very proud to have been able to be instrumental in the creation of them. I founded Little Lambs in 1987 because the church I attended needed a revenue stream and the community had no day care center. The center grew to include day care for children age 2-school age, preschool program for children 2-6, after school program and summer program. When I left we had an average of 75 children per day attending. This center continues to grow and provide child care to the community.

SHARDS came about in 2006/2007 because of lack of access to affordable mental health services. This organization brings together providers who are willing to see clients for a lower fee and then SHARDS supplements their cost. This organization also continues providing mental health services to the poor and uninsured.

Q. Health care services played a big part of your professional career. What advances in health care since you were a nursing student do you think have had the largest positive impact? Any negative impacts?

A. I graduated from nursing school in 1979 so the world of health care has changed immensely. There have been many advances in surgical procedures, medicines, and diagnostics that I believe have had a huge impact in saving and prolonging life. We have experienced the negative impact of managed care systems and the lack of personalization in health care.

Q. How does living in Wilmington compare to life in Wisconsin? Is there a favorite Wisconsin dish or food you can't get in Wilmington?

A. Wilmington and Wisconsin are like two different countries. Everything is different from topography to culture. It has been an adjustment for both Preston & me. The biggest adjustment is the weather and humidity. I don't know if I will ever get use to that. Also, we lived in a rural community in Wisconsin and did not have the traffic and building expansion that is so much a part of Wilmington.



The foods that we can't get here are locally made brats & cheese. We were used to going to the local meat market and cheese factory for fresh products.

Q. Beaver Dam is a long way from NC. It's roughly half way between Chicago and Green Bay and also close to Milwaukee. What sports teams do you root for (if any)?

A. My family are all die hard Packers fans. Always have been, always will be!!! The Packer organization is wonderful, and we are proud to be a part of ownership in the Packers. We are also Chicago Cubs fans but to a lesser degree.

Q. If you could outline a perfect day, what would you and Preston do?

A. Our idea of a perfect day would be watching the sunrise over the ocean, spending time on the beach, taking a nap

during the heat of the afternoon, then having a delightful evening meal of grilled fish and vegetables with good friends.

Q. Any final thoughts?

A. I encourage everyone to take a few minutes to fill out the survey you will be receiving so that the adult ministry program can be shaped and grow in the way the congregation wants it to be. Thank you.




BOY SCOUT TROOP 232 NEWS

LEARNING MORE ABOUT OUR GRANT RECIPIENTS

Place This nonprofit opened its doors in 2012 in order to provide supportive and trauma-informed services and housing for victims of human trafficking in our area. Their first resident for the Centre was referred by the FBI. This person was a young teen mother who had been trafficked for three years, since the age of fourteen.

This young teen mother and others who have continued to find this Centre, receive one on one counseling, casework, & vocational consulting. They also have a drop-in center for local victims looking for help.

The mission of **A Safe Place** has always been to provide direct services and build lasting and restorative relationships with these victims. Unfortunately; the need is significant right here in our community.







Wilmington Area Rebuilding Ministry's (WARM) only mission is to make homes safer by completing urgent home repairs and accessibility upgrades for low income veterans, the elderly, disabled, and families.

WARM's work improves safety by preventing falls and accidents. In addition to these types of situations, repairs to heat and air systems can improve the health of people with chronic respiratory conditions. All of this is aimed at allowing people to safely remain in their homes. Most of this work is done by volunteers.

The grant they received from the Little Chapel allowed them to build the workshop seen above. This new small building will allow them to build units for some common repairs at their site. Also, they will be able to purchase in bulk frequently needed supplies that can be stored there for future uses at less cost.

Many of the mission groups that stay at the Matthew House work with WARM while they are staying with us.
