Dear Little Chapel on the Boardwalk family,

One question that I get asked rather frequently is do I have a favorite Bible verse.

In reality I have 4 or 5, but my very favorite is Matthew 28:19-20, as for me it sums up the responsibility of all Christians. It is hard for me to not want to preach on this passage every week because there is so much in those few verses for us to understand.



This passage is Christ's "Great Commission" to his disciples and to us as well. "Go therefore and make disciples of all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit, and teaching them to obey everything that I have commanded you."

This is one of the most important commands that Jesus ever gave, and it

certainly, is the purpose of the church today. Though it challenges us to go and spread the gospel in words and deed to the ends of the earth, and though we use it as the foundation for "going out" to do mission work, I think it is also important as a tool for evangelism within our local congregation.

What would happen if we took this passage seriously in relationship to inviting people to come to Little Chapel?

YOU are important when it comes to reasons why people attend this church, or any church for that matter. Sometime ago a survey was taken to find out what had motivated people to choose the particular church where they were members. There were some surprising answers given:

11% chose their church because of denominational ties.

6% chose their church on the basis of the architectural beauty of the church buildings.

21% chose where they joined based on the convenient location of the church.

5% based their decision because of the preacher.

4% chose a particular church because there were people in the congregation they respected.

12% chose a church because of how friendly the congregation was.

41% were influenced by the fact that friends and neighbors took an interest and invited them.



Are you and I that kind of friend and neighbor? The Great Commission is not just about going across the state or nation or halfway around the world.

The Great Commission is about going across the street and inviting someone to Little Chapel on the Boardwalk.

Invite someone to come with you to church this Sunday.


We're Having Company!

The roof for the church building, damaged during Hurricane Florence, will be replaced very soon. At the same time the oldest air conditioning unit will also be replaced, since it must be removed during the roof work.

A new traffic pattern for exiting the church parking lot after the 10:30 Worship Service will be inaugurated. We will endeavor to explain the procedures to the congregation prior to beginning the new pattern. This is necessary because of the volume of traffic during the summer on West Fayetteville Street. We are trying to insure the safety of all in the area.

Church members are reminded that during worship services on Sunday mornings the town of Wrightsville Beach allows us to park on the two streets adjacent to the church, West Fayetteville and West Oxford, on the church side of the streets only, until 12:00 noon.



Scottie Anderson and Gail Miller co-chair Little Chapel's Christian Education (CE) committee.

Q. First, define for us what is your interpretation of CE?

A. Christian education is a multifaceted program within the church that offers all ages the opportunity to learn and grow in the Christian faith.

Q. Is there an age when it makes sense to begin CE?

A. Christian education begins at birth both in the home and in the church. Nursery age children are capable of learning about God and His love for us.

Q. What is the goal of CE?

A. The goal of CE is to organize and support the education programs in our church.

Q. How is CE alike and different for our children, youth, and adults? Are these programs the same year to year?

A. Christian Ed is similar for our children, youth and adults in that we support the curriculum that our various leaders choose for their groups. It is different for obvious reasons, based on the age, ability level and interest of each age group. The CE programs evolve and adapt each year based on the needs of our congregation.

Q. Describe what goes on during Children's church.

A. After the children hear the message in regular church, they go out to Children's Church where that message is extended by the Director of Children's Ministry.



The children also spend time reflecting and praying for various needs in our church and in the children's lives. Children's Church is a time to prepare the children to begin sitting with their parents in church.

Q. How do PKC and PYC fit into CE?

Presbyterian Kids Α. **Connection and Presbyterian** Connection Youth extensions of our Sunday School These programs. events are generally held in the evenings and are a time for the children and youth to bond and focus on putting into action the lessons they have learned in Sunday School.



Q. VBS is scheduled later this month? Tell us about this year's plans for the 4-days.

A. The theme for VBS this year is "Roar! Life is Wild! God is Good!" The children will learn about how children in Africa live out their faith each day and how even in the midst of turmoil God is always with us.

Q. The Puppet Ministry is very popular at Little Chapel. What is its purpose?

A. The Puppet Ministry is an important extension of CE.



Through the puppets many bible stories are brought to life which are very meaningful to the young and the old.

Q. How do you work with the Directors of Children, Youth, and Music?

A. CE meets monthly with all that are involved with our children, youth, and adults. We discuss needs and brainstorm solutions which we implement as needed.

Q. What annual events or special Sundays are part of our annual church calendar?

A. The CE year is kicked off in September with Rally Day where we celebrate our Sunday School teachers and children are promoted to the next level of Sunday School class.

Following Rally Day we have a Fall event around the time of Halloween and then we conclude the calendar year with our annual Christmas program.

In the spring we have our annual Easter Egg hunt and to conclude the CE year we finish up with our Children and Youth Sunday which is usually the first Sunday in June.

Q. What materials or literature are used in CE for children, youth, and adults?

- A. Each Sunday School teacher, children's director or youth director choose their materials and curriculum for their groups.
- Q. Are camps, retreats, etc. considered part of CE?

A. Camps and retreats for the children and youth are a big part of the Christian Ed program.

Q. Do the CE and Worship committees work together?

A. CE and Worship do work together to organize the acolytes for worship, and to organize and implement the Children and Youth Sunday in June.

Q. Since CE has such breadth and depth, how do you break down or assign your work, projects, special events, etc?

Α. The Sunday school teachers handle most of their needs and the paid Director of Children's Ministry and the **Director of Youth Ministries** handle their projects and special events. There always a need for volunteers which our congregation always steps up for!

Q. Has your work on CE changed you in any way?

A. My work on CE has helped me to understand the inner workings and dynamics of our church. There is a lot that goes on behind the scenes that most people do not see or understand. We often say it 'takes a village to raise a child'...well I say, "It takes a village to run a church!"

Just leave a message and a volunteer will return your call to arrange a pick-up time.





A 'Father's Day' story

John Walsh, an American storyteller, took a storying team to Thailand. Someone had prearranged for the team to share at a Buddhist school. To their disappointment, when they met the principal she said, "No, no! The team can't teach our children. We've changed our mind. I'm sorry to cause you to come all this way for nothing, but last week we had an American pastor speak in our general assembly. He tried to get all of our children to become Christians. We decided right then we didn't want any more American Christians speaking to our children. I'm sorry. Your team can't come here."

Well, there was no more to be said. So, the team sat there and visited politely with the principal, hoping to lessen the tension of the meeting. They discovered that there was no school the next day because it was the king's birthday. The day was called 'Father's Day' since the king was considered the nation's father. The students would be absent, but the teachers would still be present at the school. John said, "Would you like me to teach your teachers how to tell stories? I promise I will keep it secular and not talk about Christianity."

The principal said, "Oh, you would do that, even after I've canceled your program?"

John replied, "Yes, I would be honored."

The next day John taught the teachers basic storytelling techniques to improve their skills. The group laughed and had a good time, but they also applied themselves to learning what John was teaching. By the end of the day, they were all friends. The teachers had worked hard, and John admired their dedication to their profession.

Then one teacher spoke up. "This is Father's Day," she said. "Tell us a story about a father." Immediately the rest chimed in and begged for 'a father story.' John said, "Well, I have a story

about a father, but it's a Bible story, and I said I wouldn't..." The principal interrupted him. "Oh, it's all right to tell us a Bible story," she said. "These are teachers, not children." So, John told them about Abraham and how God gave him and Sarah a child in their old age. John then taught the teachers hand gestures to help them remember the story.

After the group was dismissed, the principal pulled John aside. "If I let you teach our children to tell a Bible story, would it be like that one?"

John said, "If you like that story, I'll make sure the team teaches that very story. And I guarantee you we will do nothing but teach the children to tell the story." He went over the exact details of how the classes would go. Every teacher would help with the lesson. They would then send slips of paper home with the children so parents could sign that their child told the story at least twice outside of school.

Over the next three days, the team taught the 'birth of Isaac' story to more than a thousand students in grades three through six. Each student went home and told the story at least twice. More than a thousand Thai children and teachers experienced a great cross-cultural exchange with American Christian storytellers.

And more than three thousand people listened to a Bible story they'd never heard before. The school wrote a letter of recommendation about what happened that week. They commended the team on what they'd done, and they encouraged other schools to take advantage of this opportunity if it was ever offered to them.
