

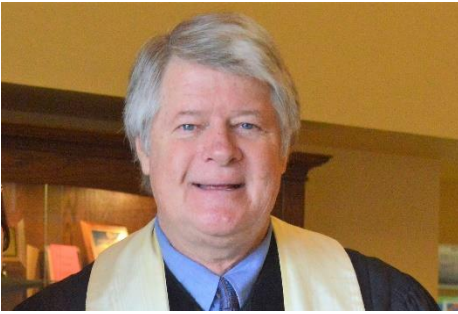

Dear Little Chapel on the Boardwalk family,

Sometime ago I was standing in line at the deli counter at Harris Teeter and I overheard a conversation between a couple of friends about dieting. I started to half listen because I could stand to lose a few pounds, and also one of the men started getting louder and I couldn't help but hear.

The man was trying to explain all the things you could eat, and the portions you could eat on this diet but the others in the group kept interrupting him saying a diet like that would not work.

The gentleman continued to argue with the others, trying to convince them that this particular diet works.

One of the members of the group began to give "physiological evidence" as to why the diet would not work. Just then the man's wife joined them and as she did, her

husband said, "Would you please tell these people that the diet works?"

She looked around at the small group and said, "Six months ago my husband weighed 235 pounds. He has been on that diet for a little more than seven months and he now weighs 198. My husband is proof the diet works."

Needless to say, that ended the argument. The reality of that one man's experience negated all the reasoning of those in the group, and even though some might have remained skeptical, as the old saying goes, "the proof is in the pudding."

You can always argue about things but living proof is the argument for which there is no reply.

I think one of the greatest tasks of the church today is to quit arguing its case verbally and demonstrate what the church is about with changed lives; lives that are transformed by the power of God.

You can present sociological and psychological data that reasonably convinces that human nature doesn't radically change, but when even one person has found new life then that is an unanswerable argument for the

fact that God in Christ does change lives.

This summer, I encourage you to put the *Book of Acts* on your reading list and read about Paul's journeys.

At different places along the way people would begin debating with him about the Christian faith and he would reply, "One day I was going to Damascus..." and the difference between Saul, who then became Paul before and after that trip was proof of what God could do. His personal experience, his own transformation was his strongest argument.

Do we live our lives in such a way that we are proof of the existence of God? Has God changed us, transformed us in such a way that simply by looking at us people receive a clearer picture of what the church is all about?

Something to think about...

See you Sunday at the place where lives can be changed.

In reviewing the financial summary for April, the session was pleased to receive the report from the financial secretary, Joan Denney, that our giving for the first quarter has been very good and we anticipate that this trend will continue. Thanks to the congregation for responding to our requests for increased giving in view of a projected financial deficit for the year.

The Christian Education Committee reports that plans are underway for our Vacation Bible School, scheduled for June 25 - 28. Volunteers are needed to help!! Signups are underway.

The Little Chapel Art and Stained Glass Historical Tour, presented by Janice Allen and Linda Allen, May 2, was wonderful! Those in attendance were so blessed by the meticulous research provided by Janice and by the description of her process for stained glass by Linda. Thank you to Janice and Linda for all your information. We learned so much about our history. What a wonderful opportunity for us to hear details of our heritage in art at the Little Chapel.

The Stewardship Committee has established a Task Force for Fund-Raising at the Little Chapel. Members Sherry Alexander, Helen Brumbaugh, Christine Kennedy, Jim Rivenbark and Becky Smith will be exploring new methods for providing increased funds for the church. Their first meeting will be on June 13. Keep this new committee in your prayers!



CHURCH WOMEN UNITED

A huge Thank You to the Presbyterian Women's Circles for your support of the Church Women United Migrant Ministry in Eastern North Carolina. Little Chapel ladies prepared 13 Migrant Health Kits! Your generous contributions will provide basic health needs to the man workers arriving in our area during the year.

City-wide, over 350 kits were donated at an estimated cost of \$10,500. Also, over 100 men's and women's long-sleeve shirts were given, and one local church gave a financial contribution of \$576 to the Telemon Corporation to purchase migrant kits.

Thanks also for supporting the CWU Friendship Day Celebration and Luncheon on May 4. Four LCOB members attended the event at St. Paul's Evangelical Lutheran Church. We participated in the worship service which focused on our gratitude for God's presence with us as we respond to childhood hunger, which is one of the most important human needs at the present time.

Four representatives from the Telemon Corporation expressed appreciation for all of the church donations, and for the Christian love extended to our area migrant workers. The meeting concluded with a delicious luncheon prepared by the ladies at St. Paul's.

LEARNING MORE ABOUT OUR GRANT RECIPIENTS



The Carousel Center's mission is two-fold: to meet the physical, emotional, and psychological needs of children who have suffered physical or sexual abuse or extreme neglect, and to improve the community through child abuse education and prevention.

Founded in 2000, they serve children throughout southeastern North Carolina, focusing on New Hanover, Pender, and Brunswick counties. In last year alone, they provided services to 501 unduplicated, new child abuse victims. Since January, 2015 the center has provided nearly 4,000 child medical examinations. 80% of these children were between birth and twelve years old, 25% of whom were between three and five years old. All of this care and counseling are provided regardless of insurance coverage status or ability to self-pay.

Their greatest hope and goal is to return the child back to childhood.



GLOW provides a unique public charter school environment for girls in 6th through 12th grades in which rigorous college preparatory education and college education are supported. The school culture challenges students to live a balanced life that develops confidence and compassion, critical thinking and personal responsibility.

Transportation to and from school is provided for each student since it is the only way the majority of students are able to attend school. Breakfast and lunch are provided for many of their students because these may be the only meals they receive all day. They also provide a free after-school program to give their students a safe educational environment until 6:00PM.

Their request for a grant was to be either for their Free Meal Program or for their College Bound Program for enrichment activities. The Endowment Committee did not specify which program and left this to their discretion.

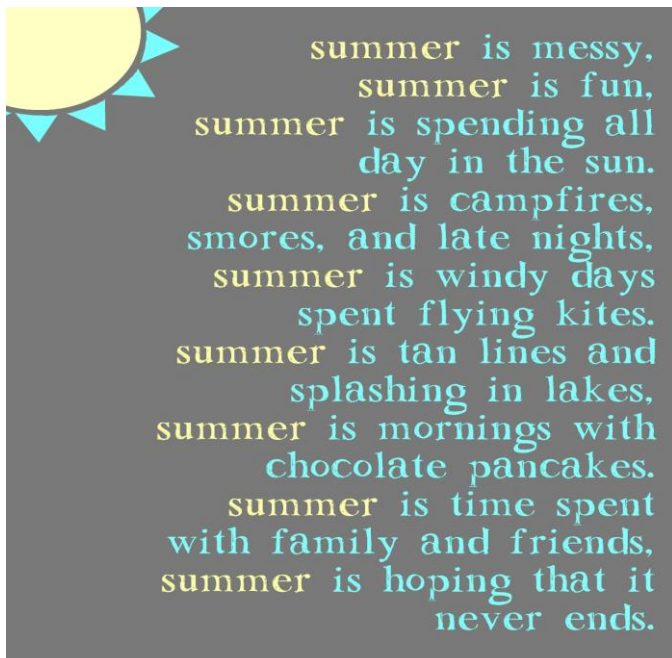

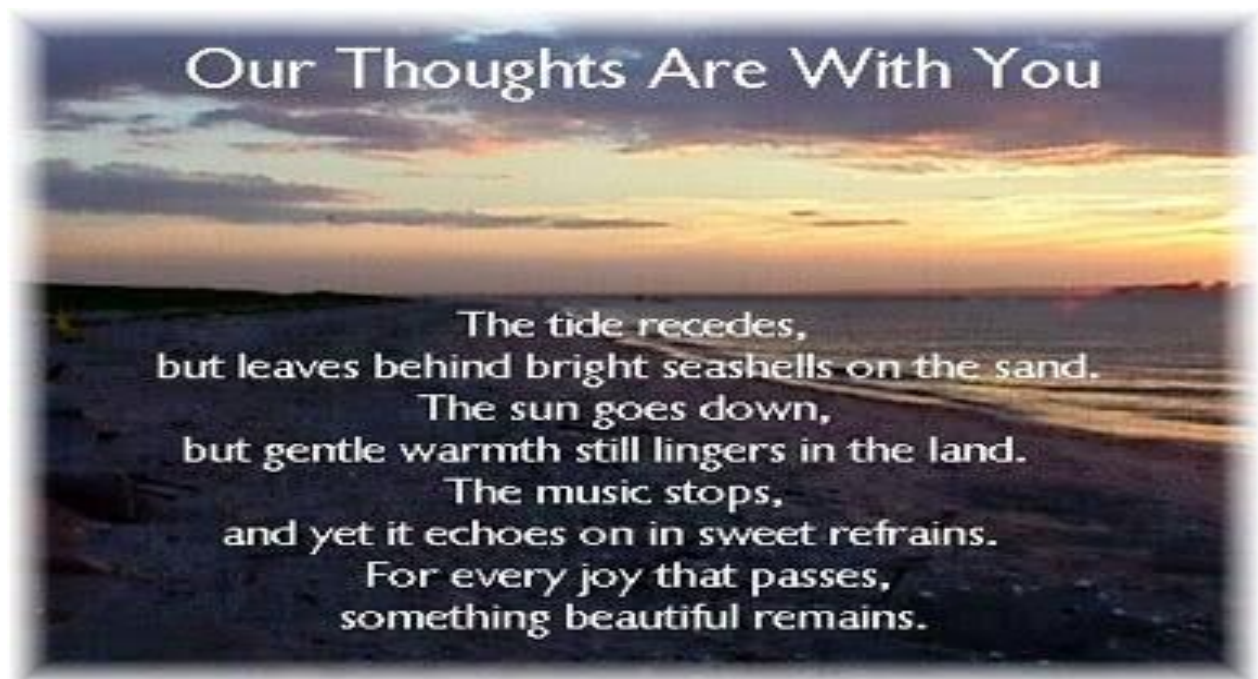

Staff Spotlight

Delores Dyer

Little Chapel's Office Administrator

When friends ask you what you do, how do you describe your work?

I tell them that I have the greatest boss in the world, I work for the Lord at Little Chapel and that I am basically the cog in the middle that keeps everything moving forward, and I love it!

If there is such a thing, describe your typical day.

I think you got it right, there isn't anything typical about my day. I usually start each morning with an idea of what my day will look like and by the time 5 pm rolls around I'm lucky if I completed half of what was on my original list. My job is all about switching gears at a moment's notice and not losing focus on what I was doing. One moment I am working on the Sunday bulletin and then, someone comes into the office and needs a parking sticker, or someone will call and need someone's phone number or address, the copy machine quit

working and I have to fix it, then there could be a maintenance issue at the Matthew House or at the Manse and I have to get someone out to repair it, or any number of other things will come up. So I stop what I am doing, take care of the issue at hand, and when I finish with that, go back to working on the bulletin. It's a constant juggle of duties and not losing focus on the task at hand.

You've worked in government and in multiple businesses. How does your work today compare to those positions?



Yes, I have worked for the government, worked in manufacturing, and have worked for architectural firms; there is absolutely no comparison between working at LCOB and all of those other entities. In those other organizations, things were very regimented and very methodical. My work today actually means something to someone; it's not just a financial or statistical report that gets filed. My work today is on a much more personal level because I have gotten to know the people who count and depend on my work, I get to see the end result and how it affects the people around me and I'm extremely grateful for that.



What do you like most about your role as Little Chapel's Office Administrator?

That's easy, it's the people. I have absolutely loved getting to know the members of this congregation. It has been wonderful to witness the love and connection with one another that this congregation has. From the first day I started at Little Chapel I have been amazed at all of the work done by this congregation in God's name.

What has surprised you most about the position?

I would have to say it is the sincere appreciation of the staff and congregation. I have never been thanked so much from so many people for what I do. It goes along with what I said earlier about this congregation being so supportive and loving, their love and support is given to me as well as each other and I appreciate it.

Was this job what you expected it would be?

Absolutely not! I came into this position with what I thought was a good understanding of what the job was, but it is so much more.

As the Office Administrator at Little Chapel you must be ready at a moment's notice for anything. I did expect that, but not to the degree that is the reality. It's also all of the little things that I have had to figure out as I go along. Certain things get done and have been done for a long time but no one seems to know where it originated from or what the next step is, so I have had to be a detective at times. It has been both challenging at times and rewarding.

What have you learned in the past year about yourself?

I have learned that it's okay to be human. I have never worked in a church before, so when I started working here I had my standards set so high that it was not achievable. I've always been on the other side, bringing in food or assisting where needed, I've never been on the side of the one delegating or organizing in the church. I think when I first started I felt like I had to be perfect at everything I did, but we all know, there is only one who was made perfect and that certainly is not me. I have learned that if you accept yourself and love yourself for who you are, who God made you to be, faults and all, and do your best; that is more than enough. As long as your heart and mind are in the right place and you keep God in the forefront of everything you do, everything will be just fine.

Describe what you would do on an ideal weekend

Don't laugh at me, but to have no responsibilities would be so nice! Working

full time with a husband in school and a teenage daughter means I am constantly on the go. There always seems to be something that needs my attention, so to not have any obligations for a moment would be awesome!

What do you do when you need to relax?

When I get to actually stop and take time to relax, I usually try to spend that time with my family. We load up the Jeep and drive out to the North End for the day. There's nothing better than relaxing on the beach with a great book. Then go home and cook out on the grill and finish up the evening sitting out back at the fire pit.

Imagine you are in your favorite restaurant, what do you order?

I am a steak and potatoes girl all the way! New York Strip - medium rare, loaded baked potato, asparagus, no dessert.

Tell us about your family?

My family is my life. I met my husband Chris in 1999 at a mutual friend's house and we knew immediately that we had a very special connection and we were married 8 months later. We knew we wanted to start a family right away and our daughter Sarah was born the very next year. Sarah will graduate from Ashely High School next year and is planning on attending CFCC. Chris is currently a student at CFCC in their RN program and will graduate in 2020. We have an 8 year old Bulldog named Axle, and a 13 year old Green Winged McCaw named Sammy.



Now imagine you and your family are hosting dinner and you can invite any 3 people - who would they be and why did you choose them?

This one is easy, sorry but these people are not famous. It would be my Mother, because she was my best friend and we lost her at a very young age. My daughter was too young to remember her and it would be wonderful for her to know firsthand just how special her grandmother was. My Father, because there is so much I didn't have a chance to get to know about him, even though he was with us until he was 77. He had so many life experiences and I didn't even find out about some of them until after he passed away, makes me wonder about the things he didn't tell me. Finally, my Father-in-law, because my Husband and Mother-in-law miss him so and if I could bring him back to allow them to have another moment with him, what a wonderful gift that would be.

What's the best advice anyone has given you?


About 10 years ago my husband and I were struggling with some very big life altering decisions that needed to be made. We

were talking with one of our friends who used to minister and do a weekly Bible study with us what he thought and he said "oh no, don't ask me". Roger then asked us a very simple question, did you pray about it? We kind of looked at each other blankly and said no. We then went on to tell him that we had to give our decision by the next day. Roger gave us some great advice that day. He said "Always pray first about any decision you have to make and wait for God to answer." He went on to tell us that if we were being pressured into making an instant decision and we couldn't wait on God, then more than likely it wasn't a good decision. He told us to ask God to block anything that wasn't his plan for us. I have done that ever since and it has been my life saver many times.

What advice would you give your daughter if she was convinced she wanted to follow in your footsteps and be a church Office Administrator just like Mom?

I would tell her that if it is in her heart to do so then I would stand behind her completely. I would also tell her that it would be one of the most fulfilling and life changing jobs she could ever have. To remember that even if you're just making a copy, you're doing God's work and always remember to treat everyone with love and kindness.

A last question...any thoughts you'd like to share with us?

I am very grateful for the opportunity to serve here at Little Chapel. I love being part of this church family.
