Dear Little Chapel family,

Ash Wednesday, February 26th, marked the beginning of the Lenten Season - a season which will go through until Sunday, April 5, which is Palm Sunday.

One of the most frequently asked question's during this season is, "What are you giving up for Lent?"



Many of you have already heard me speak or read something I have written about the whole concept of "giving up" something for the Lenten season. For me, the attitude of "giving up" something carries about the same level of commitment found in "New Year's resolutions" – and other such assurances that are on their way to being broken before the words have barely left one's mouth.

Don't misunderstand me! The penitential nature of the season of Lent – which by the way is supposed to be preparing us for the JOY that is Easter – is certainly a good time for the changing of bad habits into good habits. But let's be truthful. When your mouth starts watering for that piece of chocolate

that you're "giving up" for forty days, are you going to drop immediately to your knees in prayer for the less fortunate of our world or do you angst over that delicious piece of candy?

In a central paragraph of the discussion of the Lenten Season in The Companion to the Book of Common Worship, we read:

"Trusting in the 'accomplished fact' of Christ's resurrection however, we listen for the word of God in the time-honored stories of the church's Lenten journey. We follow Jesus into the wilderness, resist temptation, fast and proceed 'on the way' to Jerusalem, and the cross. Our Lenten journey is one of 'turning around,' of changing directions from self-serving toward the self-giving way of the cross."



Clearly, we all have habits, actions and even thoughts from which we need to "turn around" – and Lent is a wonderful season in which to do so. Rather than speak of "giving up" something – especially if the act

of doing without really contributes little to our preparation for Easter – let's work from the positive side of our imaginations.

Father, help me to see this holy season of Lent as a time of spiritual renewal, rather than a time of deprivation. Motivate me to reach a new level of experiencing your grace.

Let's add something to our lives during this season that will help someone else. Find a way to "add" something this Lenten season that will enhance your journey with Christ. Find a way to do something for someone else this Lenten season.

But remember, in the final analysis, as in all of our life of faith, it is NOT what we DO or DON'T do that accounts for anything! It is all about God's GRACE – and how we respond even as we are overwhelmed by it.

May this Lenten season be a wonderful spiritual journey that prepares you for the JOY of Easter and all the days beyond.

FEBRUARY MINUTES

These new members met with members of the Membership Committee and Session at the manse on Tuesday evening, February 11, and were accepted into the fellowship of this church by the Session.

Thanks to the Membership Committee for the lovely annual luncheon on Sunday, February 16. Our new members from 2019 and thus far in 2020 were recognized and honored at this time. The Membership Committee is led by Deacons Ginny Hall and Gerry Williamson.

The slide presentation of all LCOB activities and committees, prepared by Deacon Gary Kohunsky, was well received by all who attended the Membership Luncheon on February 16. The Session has directed that this slide presentation be run in the sanctuary every Sunday, beginning March 8, 10AM - 10:20 AM, to acquaint all members with the many activities of the church. Special thanks to Gary for this wonderful review for all of us! Members are encouraged to send pictures and information about their activities to Gary for use in this presentation.

The Session continues the study of Rev. Dr. Joan Gray's book, *Sailboat Church*. Please pray for our church leaders as we seek to understand God's calling us into a new future, led by His Holy Spirit.

Parking meters will be back in use on Wrightsville Beach beginning March 1. Members attending church should be mindful of this practice. Parking on West Fayetteville Street and West Oxford Street, on sides of the streets adjacent to the church property, will be allowed on Sunday mornings until noon.

The Finance Committee, led by Elders John Copeland and Beth Price, announced that the January financial summary is very positive. In

addition, members of the Finance Committee along with members of the Property Committee and Artwork Sub-Committee attended a meeting with our insurance agents to discuss and access our insurance coverage. Work and analysis of our insurance continues, coordinated by these two committees.

The Session approved the hiring of Marley Hall, member of LCOB, as Interim Director of Youth.

The Sacrament of Infant Baptism will be celebrated on Sunday, February 23 at the 8:30 AM Worship Service, with baptism of Eva Mae Adams, daughter of Stephen and Allison Adams, and on Sunday, March 15 at the 10:30 AM Worship Service, with baptism of Emmett David Wilkinson, son of Ben and Emily Wilkinson and grandson of Jennifer Barnes.

The Personnel Committee, led by Elders Jane Hughes and Ed O'Neil, is conducting a survey to determine future staffing needs for our church. Please keep the church officers in your prayers as they go through this process.

The Session approved a Called Congregational Meeting, March 8 after the 10:30 AM Worship Service to approve the Pastor's Terms of Call for 2020. This is a required procedure each year for PCUSA churches.

The Session is planning a Tree of Life project to memorialize our church family.



This project will involve cleaning out the library and moving historical items there, to free up wall space in the narthex for this endeavor.

Tours of the church complex will be conducted twice a year, after the 10:30 AM Worship Service, to provide new members the opportunity to explore the church facilities. Stay tuned for details.

Janice Allen, LCOB Commissioner for the Presbytery East Community Meeting in Faison, NC, on January 25, reported to the session on the meeting, which included reports from the Presbytery Youth Council and the Matthew 25 Church Initiative.



This program is designed by the Presbyterian Mission Agency and calls us to actively engage in the world around us, so that our faith comes alive and we wake up to new possibilities. (Comes from Matthew 25; 31-40)

The next Presbytery of Coastal Carolina meeting is scheduled for March 7, Trenton, NC. Elder Ed O'Neil will be the LCOB Commissioner for this meeting.

Property Committee, led by Elders Barry Lindholm and Jim Herren reported that the manse is receiving a much-needed face life, coordinated by committee member Helen Brumbaugh. This project includes painting inside and out. Painting and other outdoor repairs are being completed for the Matthew House, under leadership of Jim and Ann Martz. Other projects are underway and we are very thankful to the diligent work of the Property Committee as they strive to care for our multiple church facilities.

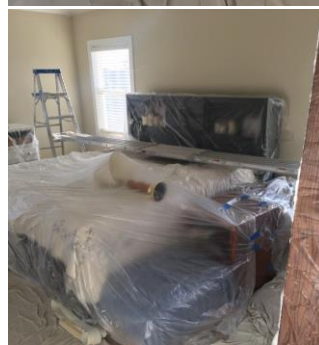
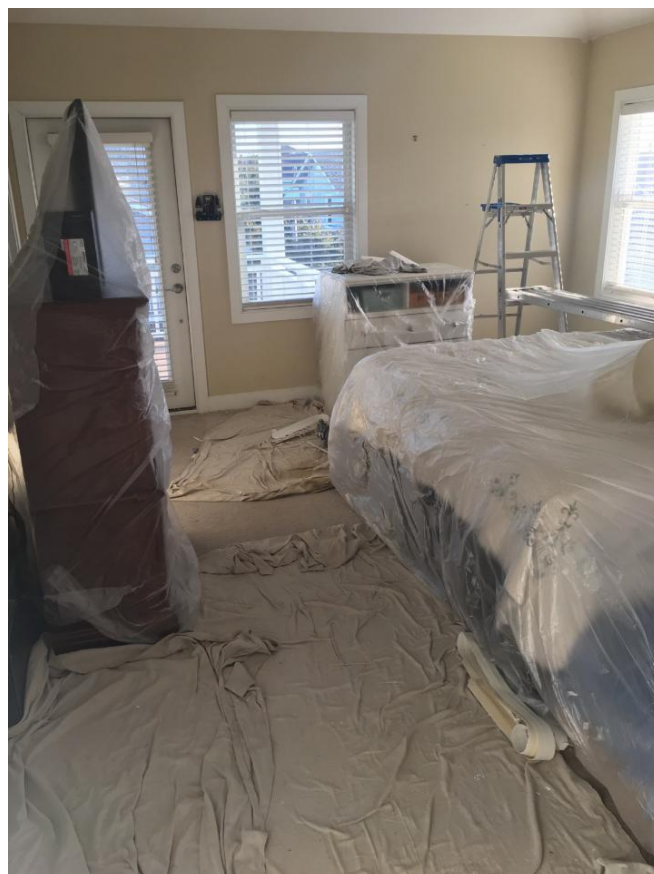

“Serving God by Serving Others”



The history of The Sister Isaac Center dates back to 1983, when Sister Mary Isaac Koenig first came to Wilmington to teach at St. Mary's school.

When not teaching, she would go door to door throughout the neighborhood around what is now the Basilica Shrine of St. Mary to determine the needs of the working poor in the communities.

To help meet some of their needs, she and some volunteers started St. Mary's Social Outreach ministry in 1985. Her most pressing concern was to find a way to provide food directly to individuals, which the local food bank couldn't do.

To accomplish this, she organized the collection of canned and boxed food donations from dozens of area churches and launched Mother Hubbard's Cupboard, which distributes food on a monthly basis.



For the next five years, Sister Isaac literally worked out of the janitor's closet at St. Mary's collecting and distributing food on a daily basis. In 1990, the Outreach Ministry moved to the roomy, bottom floor of the historic Tileston School building at Fourth and Ann streets.

The collection now includes clothing, meat and seafood, bedding, linens, appliances, household goods, furniture, baby items and toys. Financial assistance of up to \$50 is available to those who qualify to help with electric, gasoline, or medical bills. The donation is in the form of a check to go toward the expense.

Sister Isaac left the Outreach Center in 1991 to serve in an official duty for her Order and returned in 2001. When she retired in 2016, the Ministry was renamed the Sister Isaac Center in her honor.

Mary Ann Kotas now serves as Director and is assisted by a total of 150 volunteers who have a variety of duties: some help interview those in need and select the items they request from the well-organized labeled shelves; some unload and sort the donations as they are dropped off; and others stock the shelves.

The mission of the Sister Isaac Center is “to serve needy men, women, and their families with respect and reverence” and is

the reason those in need are always referred to as “guests.” Sister Isaac believed that people just wanted someone to listen to them and told her staff that *“we need to talk to people and get all the computers out of here”*.

Consequently, a permanent paper file on each guest is created, updated, and kept in the rows of file drawers in the reception room. The only computer in the Center is in the Director's office and used for financial records.

Over the years, Sister Isaac, who many called “the Mother Teresa of Wilmington” has won numerous awards and citations, including one from the Bahai' community, her first, the Albert Schweitzer Honors Scholars Award, and Pro Ecclesia et Pontifice, the highest medal the Vatican awards to a layperson.

The Center assists an average of 35 families a day, Monday – Thursday from 9 AM to 11 AM and operates with an average budget of around \$200,000 a year (all from donations, grants and fundraisers). Director Kotas says, *“we spend what we get”*.

It is closed the entire month of August, on all federal holidays, and three weeks in December so the staff will have time to devote to the many holiday activities they hold, bringing cheer to families, children, and seniors.

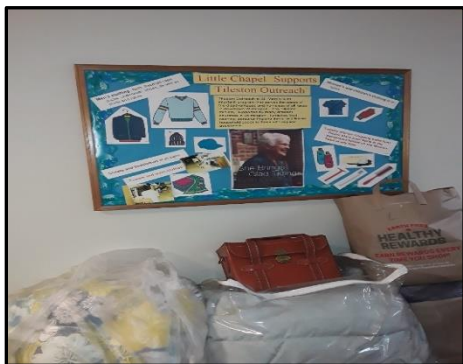
There are many organizations and churches that have contributed to the success of the Center, including our own Little Chapel on the Boardwalk, which has taken part in the Ministry since 2005.

When Libby Frye Ruoff and her husband, Bill, volunteered at

Tileston Outreach during the summer of 2003, they gained onsite knowledge about how the Outreach was filling the need of the local community.

They shared the information with the LCOB minister and others and when Libby chaired the mission committee and received approval for the LCOB project, it became one of the church's ministries.

She set up the use of the bench for donations along with a small basket for toilet articles on the mission table, which is still used today.

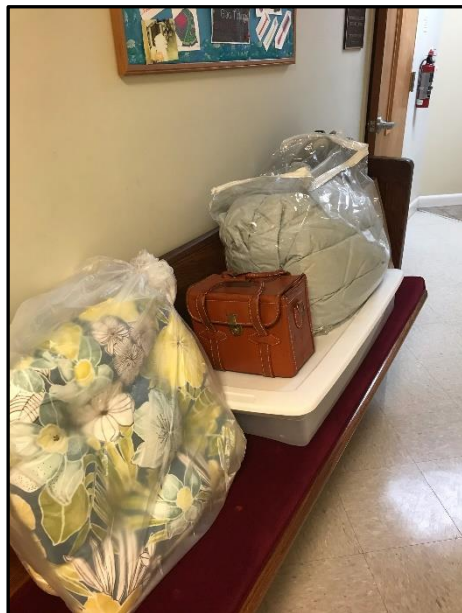
They also submit monthly newsletter articles about the

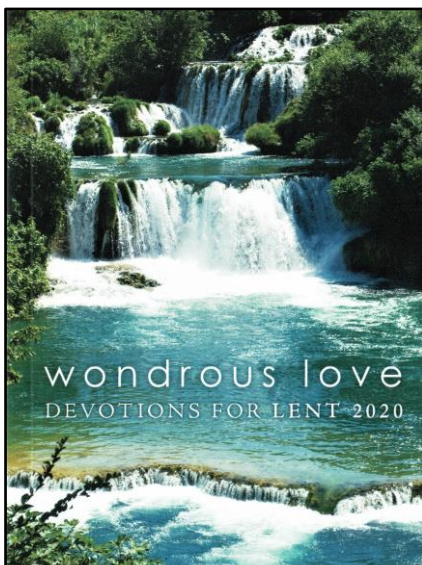

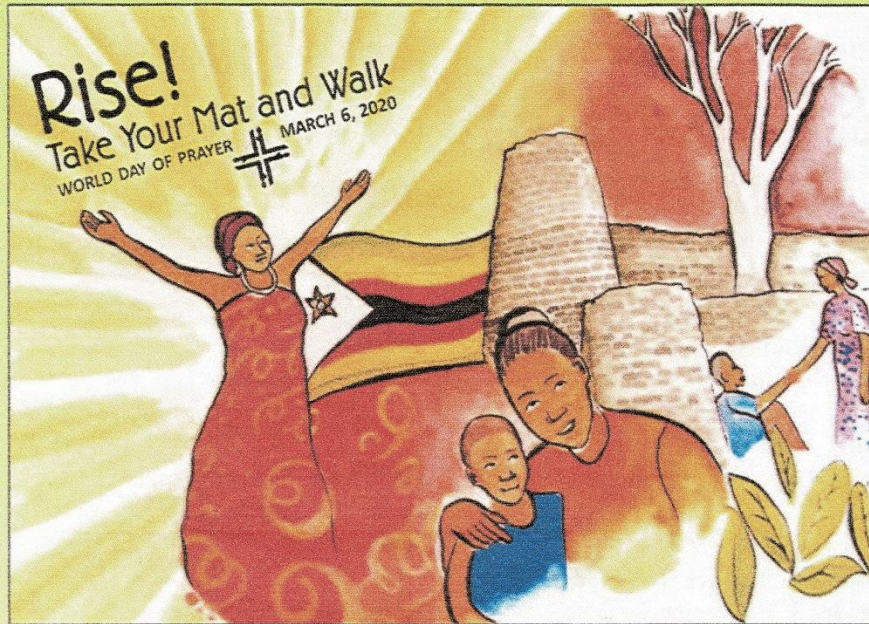

We were also amazed at the loving care and hard work that has been provided by both Jim and Ann Martz over many years! What a great tour and experience for our Property Committee!!
