Dear Little Chapel on the Boardwalk family,

I remember it vividly. I was sitting in the Southwest terminal at Midway airport in Chicago waiting for my connecting flight that would take me out to Seattle so that I could meet up with Marcia and the rest of the family.

The terminal was packed and I ended up sitting next to an older gentleman who was reading the newspaper.

After a while we began exchanging the normal pleasantries one does when in a crowded place waiting to go on to something else. Seeing I had a briefcase he asked me what I did. I told him I was a pastor. "I don't go to church anymore" he replied. I asked "Why not?"

He went on to explain. In his childhood, his mother forced him to go with her to church where he endured a lot of screaming, and a lot of hollering and pounding on the pulpit about God and how the sinful world did not give Christians any respect.

Later he continued about how his first wife made him go to church and it was nothing but more of the same. All the church did he said was bad mouth those who were not there, and call us who were there, sinners. I thought God was supposed to be merciful he said. I never heard about that God in all my years of going to church he said.

After he finished his story I told him that I didn't think that was how Jesus wanted things to turn out, and he agreed and then went back to reading his paper.

But I kept thinking about what he said and wondered how many people had left the church, or will never enter a church because they never heard about a merciful God, a God who loves.

It would seem that our Messiah modeled the right way for us to live and that is don't whine, don't scream, don't shout for respect.

Instead we should take up our cross and quietly carry it forward following our Savior and, if necessary, be nailed to it, all along actively loving – with blessings and healings and other acts of compassion – the very people who would persecute us.

That is how our Lord defended the faith in the face of non-believers. He did not use up-staging arguments, no political strategies that demanded his rights, no loud bluster. All he did was use active love in the face of persecution. In this way, he brought salvation to the world.

Maybe during this season of Lent, we can begin to follow his way.



World Day of Prayer (WDP) is a worldwide ecumenical movement of people of many faith traditions who come together to observe a common day of prayer each year on the first Friday in March. Throughout the day, we collectively pray all over the world, beginning with the first sunrise in the Pacific region and following the sun's path around the globe.

The Worship Service prepared by the WDP Committee of Suriname focuses on the goodness of God's creation. In the beginning, God created from chaos; then everything that was created found its place in creation. All were related to each other – the earth with the light, the waters with the sky, the tree seeds with living creatures, and humankind with God. None could exist without the other, and the source of all was God. Women from Suriname lift up their voices to remind us that we are all caregivers of God's creation. They are bringing to our attention the urgent need for caring at a time when more than 180 countries have signed the Paris Agreement on Climate Change. A commitment to keep the earth cooler depends on public policies implemented by governments, but also on our personal commitments to care for God's creation.

From the Director of Adult Ministry

Unlike the Children and Youth programs, which are well established, LOCB has never had an established Adult Ministry program. I was hired to build an Adult Ministry program at LCOB, starting from ground zero.

I have spent some time defining what Adult Ministry is by looking at what it is not. An Adult Ministry Program is not a senior adult group. The distinction is important. Having only a "senior adult group," limits the potential involvement to those individuals who see themselves as "senior adults."

Many other adults in the congregation will not identify with "those old people." The contrast is an Adult Ministry where all kinds of groups can develop, many of which would not even be identified as "senior adult."

My number one priority in the 8 weeks I have been working for LCOB, has been to ensure that the Adult Ministry program is built on a solid foundation; a foundation that can be added to, remodeled if necessary, and last for many years to come.

How am I doing this?

Getting the facts

How many members are 50 or older? What are the age groupings in the church? How many are homebound? What percent are males, females? Recognizing that age does make a difference, people at 50 are different from people who are 80, not only in the hair on their head but the mind inside. Therefore, any Adult Ministry program needs to have many different facets to be inclusive of multiple generations.

Discovering needs and desires

What do people actually want or need in additional activities? I have been talking with as many people as possible to see if they would be involved in such events, and, if so, what kinds of things would they like. There is no sense having events no one attends!

Establishing a committee

I have asked 4 members of the congregation to work with me for the next several months to ensure a successful Adult Ministry program. Dewi & Marti Rowlands, Mary Jo Kohunsky and Janice Allen have agreed to a 6-month time frame. We will be looking at what the components of an Adult Ministry may be and what type of programs, events, etc. need to be developed.

Developing a purpose statement

The adult ministry of Little Chapel has as its purpose to communicate and share God's love to those in the church family and to those outside the church. The assumption behind the adult ministry, the groups, and the activities sponsored by this ministry is that they exist for the purpose of serving, not being served; of giving, not receiving.

I know that many of you have been working on and waiting for the Adult Ministry program to get started. You are eager to have trips, events and programs. All of these activities are in the works, but I ask for your grace and patience as I find my way as a new staff member, ensuring that the needs and wants of many are taken into account: transportation, cost/money, health and disability needs, attitudes, time factors, etc. I don't want the Adult Ministry program focus to become so narrow that it over emphasizes certain aspects while under emphasizing other equally important aspects of adult life.

What I am working on

Day trip in March touring 3 of the nonprofit recipients of the Endowment Grant.

March date for a "lunch and learn" with the youth who will demonstrate and answer questions on how to fully utilize the smart phone (i.e. texting, Facebook, twitter, email, etc.)

An April 11 presentation at LCOB for the community and area churches, "21st Century Church Safety and Security."

Discussion with chair yoga instructor to possibly add an additional day of yoga each week, giving members an option of a different date and time.

Lining up stimulating and interesting speakers for a monthly Adult Learning Program to be held at LCOB or at an alternative location.

Meeting with various church committees to determine how we can work together to strengthen all the programs that LOCB is currently engaged in.

Grant Recipients

Since our Grant Presentation Dinner, a number of church members have asked for more information about the charities we are supporting through the Little Chapel Endowment grants.

Therefore, this is the first of a series of short articles that will be appearing in the Little Chapel monthly newsletters. Hopefully, this will give all of us a better understanding of the good we are doing through our endowment and just how we are touching the lives of those in need in a supportive and positive way.

Endowment Committee

St. Mary Pediatric Dental Health Clinic

This dental clinic, certified as a 501 (C)(3) nonprofit in 2008, serves children ages 3-17 in New Hanover and surrounding counties who are uninsured and whose family income falls within 200% of the Federal Poverty guidelines. Their staff is made up of volunteers, with only one paid person, who is their Director.

Their goal is to provide dental cleanings, sealants, fillings, and extractions for children who do not qualify for Medicaid. The clinic serves approximately 300 children in New Hanover County and nearby areas each year.

The majority of our grant (\$3,700) goes toward dental supplies. The dentists and oral surgeon volunteers serve at no cost. They donate their knowledge, skills and time and their caring hearts.

Impact for children served: When children have a healthy smile, it helps support their confidence levels. If they have dental pain, it is hard for them to focus in the classroom, making learning difficult and putting them at a disadvantage at a young age. Also, untreated dental problems can lead to more serious dental issues.

Feeding Priscilla, Our Narthex Pig




Priscilla is a very happy pig. She is getting a nice amount of donations!

At our last counting in January, (Thank you, Ann and Jim Martz!) \$104.00 had been given. This means we are averaging approximately \$45.00 a month.

All money dropped into our pig goes directly to Salvation Army to buy food for their feed the hungry ministry.

Mission Committee





On February 17, four intrepid members of Little Chapel put shovels to sand and dirt and helped to dig the foundation of the 2018 Habitat for Humanity Ecumenical Build. This year, we are working with volunteers from St. Therese Catholic Church, Holy Cross Episcopal Church, First Baptist Church, First Presbyterian Church, and Masonboro Baptist Church.

The next step comes March 3, when we join with Kwanishia (the future home-buyer) and our friends from St. Therese to construct the floor system. And when everyone stops for lunch at 11:30, our "LCOB Food Network" will be serving lunch to 35 very appreciative builders.

Folks from all 6 churches will join together for the traditional "wall-raising" on March 10, just like the iconic Amish barn-raisings. That's when the house really takes shape, and everyone can envision the home it is meant to be.



Little Chapel will next get to take part in this mission with paintbrushes in hand on May 5. And our final build day, May 12, will give us a chance to install baseboards, as well as towel bars, door stops, window blinds, and other miscellaneous hardware. You don't need to have any particular skills for this, as someone will work with you and teach you what you need to know! And the lunch team will once again bring the mid-day meal on the 12th.

Generous members of LCOB have filled all volunteer slots except for that last day. So, if you can see yourself at this build, helping to make this house become a home, sign up on the May 12 workday sheet in the narthex. Someone will contact you to help you sign up with Cape Fear Habitat for Humanity's Ecumenical Build website. If you'd rather sign up yourself, just pick up an instruction sheet from the narthex, and sign up at http://vhub.at/lcob.

Staff Spotlight: DAN HOLT

QUESTION: How long have you been with our church & how did it come to be that you were hired?

DAN: I have been with Little Chapel for about 15 years now. I applied to work as custodian at LCOB and was hired after being interviewed by 4 or 5 people. I explained that I was able to clean, do minor fixes and electrical work, among other tasks necessary for the position. Pastor Hugh was there when I was first hired. He knew a little bit of sign language so that I could understand him but not much. There was a lot of change in Pastors back then. Pat is the one who has been here the longest during my time at Little Chapel.







QUESTION: It is apparent that you take great pride in your work, how do you stay motivated?

DAN: I consider myself to have a good work ethic. I look ahead on the schedule and plan out what I need to do on certain days. Deadlines help motivate me to stay on task. God gave me the skill to help others and be passionate about my work. I enjoy my job and the people at Little Chapel. This is what helps me maintain my positive attitude.

QUESTION: What's the toughest part of your job?

DAN: The toughest part of my job is the outside maintenance. It is hard to mow the lawn and maintain the exterior, especially on hot summer days.

QUESTION: Is your daughter still in college?

DAN: Yes, my daughter is still in college. Emily is a senior at UNCW. She will graduate with a Bachelor of Arts in Communication Studies in May this year. With her major, she is focusing on Integrated Marketing Communication (marketing/public relations/advertising). She hopes to have a job in marketing/communications.

QUESTION: How do you spend your time when you aren't at Little Chapel?

DAN: I enjoy spending time with my Mother and daughter. If I'm not helping out around the house or in the yard, you can find me in my workshop in the garage.

QUESTION: You are proficient in American Sign Language. Are you able to communicate /sign with members of our church? Would it be helpful if more people knew how to sign?

DAN: I am able to communicate with the members mostly through pen and paper. Some of the staff are able to do a little bit of sign language but it would help if they knew basic signs to communicate more efficiently.

QUESTION: What would you like people at Little Chapel to know about you?

DAN: I would like people to know that I was born and raised in Burlington, NC. I attended Central Piedmont Community College where I studied printing. I worked at a printing company for several years in Charlotte. I was married once before. I have one daughter who is at UNCW and one step-daughter from my previous marriage who works as a Telecommunicator for the City of Charlotte.

The Worship committee with Pastor Pat have planned Lenten Services for Wednesdays at Noon during Lent, and also for Holy Week, March 26-31.


Plans continue for Time and Talent


