Dear Little Chapel on the Boardwalk family,

This year on May 20th we will be celebrating Pentecost Sunday.

There are so many things happening this month, but one that I want to talk about is Memorial Day.

Memorial Day emerged from the grim shadows of the American Civil War. Before the close of the war, women began decorating the graves of soldiers who had died in that war.

The practice quickly spread, and a few years later, May 30, 1868

was designated as *Decoration*Day – a day for placing flowers

on the graves of Union and

Confederate soldiers throughout
the United States.

In 1882, Decoration Day became known as Memorial Day, and all soldiers who died in other wars were also honored. Over the years, it has become a day when loved ones who have died in the service to our country are remembered. In 1971, the United Sates Congress declared Memorial Day a national holiday to be observed annually on the last Monday in May.

As most of you know, I grew up an Air Force "brat". I was 19 years old before I lived some place other than on an Air Force base. Memorial Day has always held a special place in my heart as over the years I have attended many memorial services for those killed in battle.

This year we will continue a tradition we started a few years ago of listing in the bulletin those persons who died in any battle throughout American history.

If you have already called in a name over the past few years,

you don't have to call again, as we have the list which we started a couple of years ago.

The names will be in our bulletin on May 27 and there will be a special time in which they will be remembered.

I hope that in between all the good times that we all will have Memorial Day weekend, we will at some point stop and remember those who gave the ultimate sacrifice that we might enjoy the freedoms we have.

Congregational Meeting

A Called Congregational Meeting was held on April 15 after the 10:30 AM Worship Service.

The purpose of the meeting was to receive recommendations from the Endowment Committee and to approve the Terms of Call for the pastor.

The Endowment Committee proposed the following changes to the Endowment Description: The percentages of the Endowment's annual disbursal of funds be changed from 80% to 70% to grants to approved non-profit organizations, with 15% to Property Committee for operating expenses (formerly 10%) and 15% going to the Capital Improvements Reserve Fund (formerly 10% to remain in portfolio for growth).

Another change was in the wording of the Endowment Description allowing the Governing Committee to distribute 3.5% of the Endowment Fund annually to the Session, rather than requiring this action. A third recommendation was that no governing entity of the Little Chapel shall take any action that allows the value of the fund to fall below one million dollars (\$1,000,000.00). All of these recommendations from the Endowment Committee were approved by the congregation.

The Terms of Call for the Pastor is an annual financial package that is required by Presbytery, and these terms must be approved by the congregation. Included in the Terms of Call are salary, benefits, and vacation and sick leave policies. The Terms of Call for Rev. Pat Rabun included a 3.5% salary increase for 2018. This was approved by the congregation.





APRIL HIGHLIGHTS

The session heard a report from the last meeting of the Presbytery of Coastal Carolina, March 3, from Elder Chris McKirachan, our Commissioner. The East Community will hold its June Gathering at First Presbyterian Church, Wilmington June 30, 2018. The theme is "Walk the Talk" and will be based on a small group Bible study for the gospel of Mark, May 19 - July 6. Pastor Pat will lead this study for our church. Details coming soon!

We will welcome new members on Pentecost Sunday, May 20. A meeting for prospective new members and Elders will be held at the manse on Wednesday, May 16 at 7 PM. Details can be obtained from Pastor Pat or the church office.

The session continues to struggle with the financial issues facing the church. Members of the Finance Committee met with the session in April to discuss this situation. Various ways to increase revenue were discussed and an ad hoc committee is being formed to address this need. Methods to expand our membership were also discussed.

The Memorial Brick program is underway, with Jim Smith, Jim Bolick, and Jim Alexander working on this. Forms are available in the narthex and can be turned in to the church office. Bricks will be located along the boardwalk by the front entrance to the sanctuary.

April 29 is a designated Fifth Sunday, when we will receive a special Fifth Sunday offering to help with our financial deficit.

Christian Education reported that the Easter Egg Hunt held on March 31 at the church was very successful with good attendance from the Wrightsville Beach community. Plans are now underway for our Vacation Bible School, scheduled for June 25 - 28.

The program on Security of the 21st Century Church with Sgt. Warren Kennedy was held at the church on April 11 and was well attended. The session will consider what steps should be taken to enhance security at the Little Chapel. The Property Committee has already been working to improve lighting on the outside of the building.

Plans are in place for the beach services, which will begin May 6 at access #4, Wrightsville Beach at 8 AM.



New Visitation Program

There has been much discussion regarding the Visitation Program here at Little Chapel. Some feel it is the pastor's responsibility to do visitation; others feel it is up to the Congregational Life Committee. Reality is that visitation is a combined effort of all members of the congregation, not just the pastor's or committee's job

Here at Little Chapel there are many members who contact and make personal visits to those who are homebound, hospitalized, in a rehab center, or recuperating at home. The Congregational Life Committee is grateful to these folks and wants them to continue with their personal ministry. To ensure that all members of the congregation who should receive visits will get them, Congregational Life is pleased to announce a new, more formal format for visitation:

Weekly, Pastor Pat and Susan Osteen will provide the congregation with the names of 3 individuals, requesting that congregants sign up to visit one, or all of them at some time during the week. Some of these folks are homebound; some will be nursing home visits; some at retirement centers. The 3 names will be in the bulletin every week, along with the names of the members in assisted living. The list will change weekly.

This new way of letting the congregation know who to visit on a weekly basis will greatly increase the effectiveness of the Visitation Program and outreach of the church, as well as helping members of the congregation have ministry opportunities. To be sure, visitation comes easier for some people than others, however we all need to remember that it is an honor to care for another person.

MATTHEW HOUSE UPDATE

Once again, during the month of March, college students filled the Matthew House while participating in an "Alternative Spring Break". Along with thousands of other students from across our country, they chose to spend their spring breaks by serving others in need.

Groups from both NC State and the University of Missouri served with WARM (Wilmington Area Rebuilding Ministry) helping to complete safety-related home repairs and accessibility upgrades for low-income home owners in Brunswick, New Hanover, and Pender counties.

As an example, the "Mizzou Alternative Break" group put on much-needed front and back porches, including steps; put down new flooring in a bathroom; scrubbed the entire exterior of the house; and made repairs to the roof – all within four days! They even stopped by the house to put on some finishing touches before heading back to Missouri. Check out the picture of the grateful homeowner smiling on her new porch.



A third group from Illinois Institute of Technology participated in the annual Habitat for Humanity's Collegiate Challenge program. These students spent

their week framing a house, putting in windows and helping construct the roof.



This year the Birthday Offering will go to three recipients. Two of the recipients are located right here in the US. A brief description of each program follows:

The first is The Cottage Village, located in Cottage Grove, Oregon. This group plans to use the grant to build 13 tiny houses, thus creating a structured social community for individuals and families with very low incomes. With a centrally shared use area, these vulnerable rural citizens will have a protected environment in which to live.

The Dwelling Place in Minneapolis and St. Paul, Minnesota was established in 1998 as a support service for women and children as they escaped violent home situations. The grant will help purchase a vacant lot to build a multi-use facility at one location for group programing, case management, safe living spaces and staff offices.

The third recipient is the Village of Grace Center for Physical and Spiritual Health, located in Tegucigalpa, Honduras. This grant will enable the Presbytery of Honduras to purchase this retreat center in order to host international workshops, retreats and mission teams. The Presbyterian Women of Honduras will manage the facility.

The Scripture being used to further the importance of this offering is taken from Hebrews 4:16 (NKJV). It says:

"Let us therefore come boldly to the throne of grace, that we may obtain mercy and find grace to help in time of need."

MAY'S STAFF SPOTLIGHT SHINES

ON

Emily Donovan Director of Youth Ministries

What are the goals you set to achieve with and for our youth at Little Chapel?

My primary goal is to grow a deep-rooted faith in Christ for students in Grades 6th – 12th that will ground them as they transition into adulthood.

You plan and organize trips, retreats, missions and so much more. Why not just weekly PYC gettogethers?

During the school year, from September to May, we meet weekly every Sunday evening for 2 hours—we do this in addition to our year-round Sunday School class. On Sunday evenings, we share a meal together, play a few games, and then, either have a Bible lesson or participate in a local service project. Our fantastic parent volunteers plan, cook, and prepare our Sunday evening meals.

These weekly gatherings are a great way for everyone to check-in with each other before the start of another week and nurture their spiritual growth and Christian friendships. However, this is just one piece of the puzzle that makes our youth program meaningful.

Offering trips, retreats, and mission opportunities is, in my mind, critical to building a faith that is deeply-rooted. The human brain becomes more alert and aware when we travel outside of our comfort zone.

Taking teenagers out of town to discuss the Bible ensures these crucial messages get coded into their long-term memories.

I challenge you to spend five minutes with any of our students and ask them what they REMEMBER most about PYC and 9 times out of 10 they will tell you a story about one of our trips.

Our youth seem to have a bond, a connection with each other. Is there a common thread?

Our youth program is very unique and special. We have nearly full participation within our youth ministry programs--meaning all the families with teenagers that regularly attend Little Chapel participate fully in our PYC programs. This speaks volumes to the type of bond and connection these students feel for one another.

I try to achieve this by making every student feel like they are welcome and that they belong here—but it's also up to the students to make each other feel accepted. I work to guide and remind them through scripture that we are meant to be each other's keepers. That life already tries to label and separate and exclude and ignore—but within PYC we will love and accept anyone willing to share their time with us.



What's the most difficult part of your job at Little Chapel?

Maintaining visibility with the congregation. Our core ministry work happens on Sunday nights and when we take overnight trips. The majority of our students do not attend the 10:30am worship service—so it's hard for church members to see all that we do and meet these amazing students.

Another challenge is balancing everyone's needs. Ministry work is like trying to solve a puzzle that keeps rearranging itself midway through solving. Every student has their own set of needs; they are not all starting from the same foundation. It can get challenging to bring all those different dynamics to the table and spiritually feed each individual need.

What brings you the most satisfaction in your work?

I love when the students get excited about events and programs we do. Obviously, that's a self-serving satisfaction—a lot of behind-thescenes work goes into planning Sunday School, PYC and every trip—so when the students get excited to come to church and participate in PYC programs—it's a type of validation that reconfirms I'm meeting their needs.

I also love "light bulb" moments where we're exploring scripture and they truly connect with the passage. It's humbling to watch God ignite something inside them and getting a front row seat to bear witness to those moments.

When you aren't being the Youth Director, how do you like to spend your time?

I love spending time with my family and volunteering within the community. We are pretty active during the week with extracurricular activities, meetings, etc. and I spend the majority of my Sunday with the youth at

Little Chapel—so Saturdays are sacred family days for the Donovans. I love to read, learn new things, and travel.

Now that we have Directors of Children's and Adult Ministries, how does the Youth Ministry fit between or alongside them....or does it?

The Youth Ministry fits naturally between and alongside these two ministries. Teenagers require a specific type of messaging. They've outgrown the Children's program—but aren't yet ready for Adult ministry. They require a program that can channel their energy, give them a loving space to explore their thoughts, doubts, and questions, while at the same time provides a safe place to land—or crash.

Teenagers go through a tremendous amount of physical, emotional, and developmental changes as they prepare for adulthood. They are wired to begin stepping away from their parents, to find their own footing, and begin surviving independently. It's important that we protect these years and offer a safe space for them within the church to develop these skills. I'm excited to work with both ministries to figure out age appropriate ways we can support each other.

Would you rather cook or dine out? What would be on the menu that would make you happy?

Dine out! Our family has a variety of dietary needs—David is gluten free, I love bread. Mirabelle decided to become a vegetarian—even though she hates vegetables, and Finn is a pretty adventurous eater. Eating out means we all get to order what we want—and someone else does the dishes.

I love a good mac and cheese.

What's the most interesting book you've ever read?

Is this a trick question? Am I supposed to say the Bible? Honestly, the Bible is the most

fascinating book I have ever read. The same passage can have a different meaning depending on what age and stage you read it at—it's the best living document we have.

What's your favorite family activity?

I love when we get to spend time together, be it family movie night, beach day, going on vacations, or playing board games.

When you need some quiet moments alone, what do you do?

I hide in the bedroom. I did that a lot before the twins started elementary school.

Are there plans for a vacation or family get away this year?

Yes, we always try to take one in the summer—even if it needs to be low-key. It's important to get away from all the distractions of daily life and just focus on each other. Dave's traveling to Texas at the end of May so we're deciding if it's feasible to join him for part of his trip and explore Austin and San Antonio—the twin's godmother lives right outside of Austin. We'd love to spend time with her family and explore big sky country.

Do you have a role model you respect or admire more than others? Do you see yourself as a role model?

I used to have a lot of role models—but have found over the years there's a danger in doing this. Humans are notorious for making mistakes. Instead, I now admire the work people do more than who they appear to be. Putting a friend, or celebrity, on a pedestal distracts my focus from maintaining a closer connection with God and discerning where I'm being called to serve next. I try not to look at myself as a role model either—that feels stressful.

Is there a particular quote, saying, or maxim which has special meaning in your life?

Yes, Dave bought me a necklace right before we embarked on our journey to have children. It said "Fearlessness" in Sanskrit. Failure can feel awful—this word reminded me to let go of the fear of failure and just embrace the journey.

Finally, finish this sentence. "My greatest joy in life is....."

My greatest joy in life is being around my children.

HABITAT FOR HUMANITY UPDATE


