

Many members and friends are unaware of the Endowment Fund and its mission. This article will provide an update on the background and financial results of the Fund through December 2021.

The Endowment Fund was established on 6/17/16 with a \$ 1,000,000 position after the sale of the original Manse on the waterway and after building the new Manse and paying off existing mortgages.

PURPOSE OF ENDOWMENT FUND

- a. To provide the members and friends of LCOB with the opportunity to make charitable gifts that will become a permanent endowment of financial support
- b. To provide funds on an annual basis to support missions
- c. To provide funds on an annual basis to support capital improvements

- 3- Elder members
- 3- Members of the congregation

DUTIES OF GOVERNING COMMITTEE

- a. Select the financial institution to manage the funds with guidelines set by committee
- b. Charged with investing the Endowment Fund
- c. Solicit donations from members and friends of the congregation

INVESTMENTS OF THE ENDOWMENT FUND

The goal is to manage the fund to preserve capital, while obtaining returns which will enable the Church to support missions and the capital needs of the Church

DISTRIBUTIONS FROM THE ENDOWMENT FUND

The committee may distribute 3.5% of the funds annually, above the \$1,000,000 base investment Of the 3.5%,

70% distributed goes to missions (Charitable 501c3 Organizations) the funds available are approved based on grants received and approved by the Mission Committee

15% distributed to Capital Improvement Reserve Fund-Insurance Deductible Fund

15 %distributed to Capital Improvements designated by the Property Committee

GIFTS TO THE ENDOWMENT FUND

Donors' gifts or bequests to the Fund must be given without designating a specific purpose of the gift.

Your Session met for a stated meeting on Monday, April 18, at 6:00 p.m.

At the beginning of each meeting, Pastor John Earl leads us in a devotion and prayer. This month we are particularly praying for wisdom and discernment of the best vision for the future of the entire congregation.

The Session approved the new schedule for the beach service for 2022. Regular 8:00 worship on the beach will begin on Sunday, May 1, and the last service will be on Labor Day, September 4. The service will move indoors on September 11 and will be held in the fellowship hall.

More than thirty members of LCOB participated in the spring cleanup day on Saturday, April 2. Thanks to generous donations in honor of or in memory of loved ones, funds allowed the purchase of new plants to beautify the property. Participants enjoyed the fellowship and the chance to do useful work together on a lovely day.

The Personnel and Planning Committee recently held a training session for volunteers who will cover office duties during an absence by our administrator, Delores Dyer. The team is ready!

Although the position of part-time Youth Director has been posted for a few weeks, we have yet to receive any responses. The Session will be informed of new activity in the future.

The recent forum on the beach service was attended by several members, and the general consensus was that there should be no changes to the time, place, length, and format of the service at this time. There is concern, however, that the service could be better marketed, and options are being investigated.

Members of the session prepared casseroles and packed lunches for Meals on Wheels on April 23. Any groups at LCOB may sign up to serve this mission on one Saturday, and no driving is required. Contact Patty and Wilson Rogers, MOW coordinators, or Beckey Smith or Marti Shogi of the Mission Committee.

The LCOB website is updated as needed. Committee leaders are encouraged to let Gary Kohunsky know of needed changes or additions.

The church ended the first quarter of 2022 with a Net Income/Surplus of \$32,856. This is \$8,833 better than budget.

First quarter pledge income of \$128,475 was 2% below plan. We are grateful for the support of the congregation and feel that we are still on target to meet the total year income budget of \$457,834.

First quarter expense of \$95,619 was 10% below plan. All committees did a good job of expense control. The drivers of the underrun are listed below:

- The youth director position was unfilled for most of the quarter (\$4,276). The personnel committee is currently advertising for a replacement.
- Church utilities The property committee anticipated that utility usage would increase in 2022
 as the church emerged from the pandemic. The increase has not occurred and this has
 created an expense underrun of (\$2,803).
- Property repairs and maintenance has experienced a \$(2,633) underrun in the first quarter.

In summary, the church had a good first quarter. We are thankful for the continued support of the congregation.

The Landscape Committee

Have you, like me, never noticed the thousands of square feet of landscaping that surrounds Little Chapel, in addition to the plantings in front of the church entrance? It totals thousands of square feet...from the landscaping in front of Matthew House, all along Fayetteville Street to the corner, then around on Lumina Avenue to the corner of Oxford Street, all the way down to the Manse.

The church grounds haven't always looked as good as they do now, thanks to the guidance of the Landscaping Committee and the LCOB volunteers.


The Committee came into existence when under various leaderships, some members of the Property Committee (and their wives) were considered a "subcommittee" who were responsible for taking care of the plants and new

landscaping projects – there was a lot of selffunding contributed in addition to their work.

The goal was to ensure that the outside of the church was as welcoming and positive as the inside of the church. "The image needed updating, particularly with our exposure along Lumina to car and foot traffic".

When Barry Lindholm became Chair of the Property Committee, this became even more important. It was determined that a more formal plan was needed.

So, in 2019, the Committee hired Tracy McCullen, a landscape architect, to set up a five-year plan for all areas around the church.

Once the plan was adopted, the question was, "How do we fund it?"

The idea was to partner with garden clubs that could help coordinate and provide resources for the beginning of the landscape conversion.

It came to fruition on November 9, 2020, when 20 LCOB volunteers and 20 from the New Hanover and Harbor Island Garden Clubs worked together weeding, pruning, planting, and putting down mulch. The Committee estimated that there were about 120 "people" hours worked that day.

Thanks to Kathy Blizzard's connection with the New Hanover Garden Club, we also received a donation of \$3,000, plus the purchase and installation of a Meditation Bench.

Covid prevented the Committee from holding Spring and Fall workdays in 2021, but on April 2 of this year, 33 LCOB volunteers – spouses, children and even grandchildren – came together to work on the "Spring Spruce Up Day" event, which was a huge success!

I was very impressed with the organization of the event by the Landscape Committee. A table was set up under the portico with a list of everyone who had signed up to volunteer that day. Each person was given a specific zone to work in (See zone areas in plat on Page 1). They were told to check back in when done for their "reward": a bag of cookies, a granola bar or both.

The work continued all day as dead and overgrown bushes were removed, flowerbeds were weeded, existing plants were repurposed, new plants were put in and mulch was put down.

The budget of the Landscape Committee is a little over 11 percent of the Property Committee Budget. Because of the need for more consistency and upgrading this year, it was decided by the church that members could designate donations to the landscaping fund as part of the yearly One Hour of Sharing collected on Easter Sunday.

In an effort to maintain the church grounds on a continual basis, the Committee is asking for volunteers to select a designated landscape area to be responsible for its weeding as needed.

For example, Jim and Ann Martz are solely responsible for maintaining the outside garden areas of the Matthew House. Betty Gischel has selected a corner area in the parking lot to oversee and seasonally plant.



This is our only outreach fundraiser. Funds raised go to pay for our Eden Village house, built in honor of Pastor Pat and Marcia Rabun.



ACTION AND CONTEMPLATION

Let me begin with a few reflective questions for you about the CHART below

"Paradoxes to Ponder"

- What is a balanced and integrated Christian life?
- Are both dimensions on this chart important?
 Why?
- Why might they be considered paradoxes? Or are they two sides of one coin?
- Have you ever experienced the tension (tug of war) between these two poles?
- Is there truth and false in both extremes?
- How familiar are you with such paradoxical, mystical, contemplative thinking?
- Is the reconciliation between these seeming opposites at a higher (or deeper) spiritual level?
- In your own life, with which of these poles have you wrestled?
- What paradoxes could you add to this list that have been important in your own life?
- Can you recall the line from the hymn we sang in worship on March 27th? You may want to look it up again – No. 667, vs. 1 ... "Alike at work and prayer to Jesus I repair..."


If you are struggling with these questions, you are not alone. Whether we are aware of them or not, we move between each of these poles throughout our lives. Maybe you want to use this chart as a self-assessment tool to discover where on these continuums you live much of your Christian life. Then pay attention to how you might need to integrate its other pole.

In the next few months, I will continue to address these issues. My article about the *Cloud of Unknowing* in the March newsletter and this month's topic are introductions to such themes.

MEET BROTHER LAWRENCE

Today I want to introduce you to a favorite character of mine – *Brother Lawrence*. If you glance at the photos surrounding this article, you will discover that he is pretty well known in Christian literature.

To me. Bro. Lawrence

embodies the way I would like to live my life – in **BALANCE** between action and contemplation. The way he lived his life would probably also apply to many of the other seeming opposites in the chart above.

You know that there is no right or wrong. We must pay attention to what both sides of these ranges have to teach us about living as a Christian in this world! I know... Jesus seemed to laud Mary's place at His feet more than Martha's busy preparations, but (theological interpretations aside), none of the people there would have had a meal without Martha. The Apostle Paul talked in most of his letters about "flesh" and "spirit" — and the Protestant Reformation was all about "works" and "faith." In our worship services, we "saints" regularly practice confession of our sins.


Let's meet Bro. Lawrence and see how he united action and contemplation. Contemplation is a kind of prayer – just being with God, often without words, prayer of the heart – according to what the scripture asks us - to "pray without ceasing".

PRACTICING THE PRESENCE OF GOD

Brother Lawrence (1611-1691) was an obscure seventeenth century French Carmelite monk, who entered the monastery after a career as a foot soldier.

He was born into a poor family in Lorraine, France - Nicholas Herman (later known as Brother Lawrence). He described himself as a "clumsy

fellow who used to break everything." He was installed by his superiors in the kitchens as a household servant, washing pots and pans. Brother Lawrence resolved to use his time to be constantly aware of God's Presence.



He sought to create an habitual state of communion with God, determined to live every moment constantly aware of God's presence. He blended his work with prayer – transforming his mundane chores in the kitchen into glorious experiences of heaven.

In time, he acquired such holiness that even the abbot would go to him for advice. His conversations (and letters) were recorded and later published (in 1692). It has since become a classic source of inspiration – "The Practice of the Presence of God."

Brother Lawrence's Prayer


My God, here I am all devoted to Thee. O Lord, make me according to Thy heart

Before you read Bro. Lawrence's quotes from the book, here some more QUESTIONS to ask yourself:

- How do you "recollect" (tune in to) the presence of God in daily life? What helps you to become more aware of God's presence?
- When in what life situations might this be particularly crucial?
- How do you seek to practice the command in the scripture to "Pray without Ceasing"?

EXCERPTS from the book The Practice of the Presence of God [bolded parts are mine]

I renounced for [God's] love everything that was not Himself, and I began to live as if there were only He and I in the world...[I kept] my mind in His holy presence and recalling it whenever I found I had become distracted from Him. I continued in spite of all the



difficulties I found in practicing it, not becoming troubled or worried when I was involuntarily distracted. I maintained this practice no less during the day than during my times set aside for prayer."

There is not in the world a kind of life more sweet and delightful than that of a continual conversation with God.

I make it my business only to persevere in his holy presence wherein I keep myself by a simple attention and a general fond regard to God, which I refer to as an "actual presence" of God. Or, to put it another way, an habitual, silent, and secret conversation of the soul with God.


That all bodily mortifications and other exercises are

are useless, but as they serve to arrive at the union with GOD by love... the shortest way, to go straight to God by a continual practice of love, and doing all things for God's sake.

Amid the clatter and confusion of my kitchen...l hold to God, and with great tranquility as though I

were on my knees...



This is how I began... for the first year I spent much of the time set apart for devotions thinking about death, judgment, hell, heaven, and my sins. I applied my mind to these thoughts in the morning and then spending the rest of the

day, even in the midst of all my work, in the presence of God... and yet I must tell you that for the first ten years I suffered a great deal. The awareness that I was not as devoted to God as I wanted to be... of my past sins... and the great yet unmerited favors God did for me were the source and substance of my suffering.

[He finally concluded...] That there was need neither of art nor science for going to GOD, but only a heart resolutely determined to apply itself to nothing but God, or for God's sake, and to love God only.

Words of Bro. Lawrence's Abbot in a conversation with him

He told me that...

... it was a great delusion to think that the times of prayer ought to differ from other times; that we are as strictly obliged to adhere to God by action in the time of action as by prayer in its season...and that when the appointed times of prayer were past he found no difference because he still continued with God, praising and blessing him... his prayer was nothing else but a sense of the presence of God, his soul being at that time insensible to everything but divine love, and that when the appointed times of prayer were past he found no difference because he still continued with God, praising and blessing Him with all his might...

So, now it's up to us to **practice** as Brother Lawrence did – whether at home or in our workplace – in constant awareness of the abiding presence of God's Spirit with and within us.

I want to conclude with a quote by one of my favorite modern mystics. It gives us clues about how that can happen, how we can pay attention to both "poles" – such as action and contemplation - at the same time.

"There is a way of ordering our mental life on more than one level at once.

On one level we may be thinking, discussing, seeing, calculating, meeting all the demands of external affairs.

But deep within, behind the scenes, at a profounder level, we may also be in prayer and adoration, song and worship and a gentle receptiveness to divine breathings...

ever the accent must be upon the deeper level --- a mental habit of

inward orientation must be established ..."

Thomas Kelly (1893-1941, from A Testament of Devotion).


