OCTOBER SESSION MEETING HIGHLIGHTS

The Session met for a Stated Meeting on Monday, October 21, 2019 at 7 pm.

The Session was happy to receive new members Darlene and Sam Durham. Dolores Myers, Miriam and Charles Smith, and Patty and Wilson Rogers. The transfer of membership for Nancy and Cos Cosby to the Liberty Road Faith **Fellowship** Church. Lexington. KY was also approved.

Communion and Traveling Communion will be celebrated on Sunday, November 3. Our church will also celebrate All Saints' Day and we will remember twelve members of our church who passed away in 2019.

Christ the King Sunday is November 24 and the sacrament of communion will be celebrated on that Sunday.

Boy Scout Troop 232 will be selling Christmas wreaths in the Fellowship Hall on Sunday, October 27 and Sunday, November 3, after both worship services.

Prices for the wreaths remain the same (\$25 and \$30).

The Finance Committee is accepting budget requests from all committees by October 31, so that a final church budget for year 2020 can be prepared.

LCOB annually pledges financial support to the Presbytery of Coastal Carolina. This pledge includes a per capital assessment of \$10.80 per member. which underwrites the governing body of the General Assembly Svnod. for total of \$4,717.50 from our church for 2020 year. In addition, we voted to support the programs and ministries of the Presbytery with donation of \$2,500 for year 2020.

The Session is pleased to have an off-duty police officer from the Wrightsville Beach Police Department on the church premises on Sunday mornings, 8 am - Noon, to provide security.

The Nominating Committee continues its work in securing new church officers (elders and deacons).

A congregational meeting will be called for November 10 after the 10:30 am worship service to elect these officers. Installation and Ordination of new officers will be held on November 17 at the 10:30 am worship service.

Stewardship Sunday will be celebrated on Sunday, November 17, when pledges for financial support for 2020 will be presented for use in God's work at this church.

A retreat/planning session for all church officers will be held at the manse on Saturday, November 16, 9am – 3 pm. Advent and Christmas activities and services are being planned by the Worship Committee.

An Advent devotional booklet written by our members will be available.

The Children's Christmas pageant will be presented on December 8 at the 10:30 am worship service.

The annual Christmas cantata by the chancel choir is scheduled for Sunday, December 15 at the 10:30 am service. There will be only one worship service on that Sunday.

PIZZA, COOKIES & CAROLING

Sunday, December 8, Congregational Life will sponsor a free pizza lunch immediately after worship. We are asking that church members provide dessert by bringing their favorite Christmas cookie and enjoy a cookie exchange.

STEWARDSHIP MOMENT

During both Reformation Sunday worship services, Marie Godsell shared these words with the congregation.

Those of you who know me well, know that I am stepping out of my comfort zone to stand in front of you today. And those who don't know me at all, might be wondering why the stewardship committee has asked a guest to speak to them. To the surprise of some, I am not a visitor - I became a member of this wonderful congregation in 2014.



Those same friends who asked me to speak to you today are fully aware that when asked to help out I will. This is the reason why I have agreed to muddle through this uncomfortable task of speaking before you this morning. I am going to read directly from my notes so that I don't hold you captive for longer than is necessary, especially with the aroma of bacon still distracting us.

Every month we have had the pleasure of hearing stories from members sharing tales about why they love Little Chapel on the Boardwalk.

Most of those stories mentioned the wonderful people here, and the endless opportunities for involvement. Our members have reminded us that Pastor Pat is compassionate, articulate, and a wonderful leader who motivates us weekly.

David, our music director continues to take us to new heights with his talent and creativity. Emily and Angela inspire our young people on a daily basis. Delores, Joan and Dan keep our church running like a fine-oiled machine.

Our Elders and Deacons oversee the care of the property, our worship services, the well-being of our members and the general management of our church.

Most of you know that and although you may have expected a short story about me and my accidental arrival to Little Chapel, (which isn't really that interesting anyway) I am going talk to you about why this church encourages me to step up and get involved when I normally would shy away.

I moved to Wilmington in 2013 and did not have the chance to find a church family before I was faced some personal with challenges. Prior to moving here, I had the privilege of living in several locations - large cities well as remote rural areas. Whenever I moved within Canada, The United Church of Canada was my beacon shining brightly, so I didn't have to make a choice - I simply transferred my membership to the closest United Church within walking distance.

However, when I moved to America in 1996, I quickly discovered that not only is there no United Church of Canada, but that all Presbyterian churches are not alike, nor are the Congregationalists nor Methodists.

I've yet to visit a Baptist church so I can't comment on that. When we would move, it could take me over a year to find my faith community.

What first attracted me to LCOB was the allure of the beach service.



The ocean had become a place for healing for me, so what could be better than worshiping God while feeling the sand between my toes and listening to the waves roll in?

I wandered into the 8:30 service one Sunday morning, hoping to anonymously listen to a sermon that would carry me through the week, and then slip out with a wave and smile of gratitude.

If you have been a consistent attendee of the 8:30 service, you can recall that it's impossible to remain anonymous when there are less than 20 people sitting on this side of the church. Those few people were a little curious to find out who this new person

was and they quickly became my friends.

I had found my Sunday morning sanctuary so I made an appointment to speak to Pastor Pat about joining this friendly congregation.

I distinctly remember Pat asking me why I wanted to join the church and him cautiously reminding me that LCOB is not just about the 8:30 beach service.

He strongly encouraged me to attend the 10:30 service and then call him back to let him know if I still wanted to join. What?

The minister is discouraging me from joining the church at a time when congregational memberships are on the downslide? He told me that the traditional service would give me more insight into this wonderful church community.



So, I attended my first 10:30 service and everything Pat had predicted happened. I was greeted by more than a dozen people asking me if I was visiting, and where I was from, and if I have children, and how are those children? and what do I do for a living, and could I sing - David can confirm that I cannot.

So, I became a member and shortly thereafter got a call from Mila informing me that someone had nominated me for Stewardship Deacon.



My quest to remain anonymous had been foiled. Considering I had no idea what was involved, I was prepared to politely decline laundry with а list excuses. Brian Ennis was the chair of stewardship at that time and so I contacted him for additional information, fully prepared to let him know just how busy my life was.

He very politely told me that he had managed quite easily to give a little of his time to our church while running a business, raising young children with Tricia who also worked full time and that he still had time to train for a competition.

God was nudging me in a big way. Although this may sound like I am telling you that guilt settled into my soul - that wasn't at all what I experienced. It was more of a "wonderstuck moment of why not?"

If this group thinks I can help them out, I should give it a try despite my lack of experience. A few years ago, David approached me and said he had a favour to ask. Narrating the Christmas Cantata was not at all what I expected and immediately told him I was not qualified. I was mortified - Me? Why me? I'm not capable. I'll mess up the entire performance that the choir has worked diligently on for months.



And I hate speaking in front of a large group. Then there was that nudge again - a voice reminding me that this isn't about me, it's about our church and a choir performance - I could do this.

I have told you these stories because of the feedback I received during the years I helped with our Stewardship Campaign. Suggesting that I take on a role whereby I encourage members I don't know to part from their hard-earned money was definitely out of my comfort zone.

I spent 3 years in this position trying to think of ways to educate our members on the importance of pledging without offending personal beliefs and budgets.

We are extremely fortunate to live in a very comfortable society. Perhaps it is presumptuous of me to assume that everyone in our midst knows what it is like to earn a paycheque, or be responsible for

bills, or rent a place to live, or take care of a loved one.

But this is what I am talking to you about today. The act of pledging is a responsibility to our church similar to you taking care of your lifestyle and home environment.

It's important to understand the intake of funds in order to budget for programs, salaries, insurance and property maintenance. And that's what pledging on Stewardship Sunday is all about.



Last year the pledge form was changed to include a line that states, "I will give when I am able."

We added this line because we were optimistic to receive 100% commitment from our members. I realize that for many of you I am preaching to the choir – but for those of you who wonder, 'Why? Why do I have to pledge? If I give money next year, won't it be a bonus to the business plan?'

Yes, you can view it that way, but please let our bookkeeper know by pledging your support to 'give when you are able' so we can confidently move into 2020 with a budget in place. Another concern we were faced with was the question of anonymity.

I started speaking to you this morning about how I love to remain anonymous when I can – and you will too. Every family has their limitations and financial goals, and no one is judged by the giving of another. And every individual has personal reasons for why they give.

There is only 1 person in this church who will have access to your pledge card and that is our bookkeeper.

Life is full of wonderstruck moments – or God winks. And the members of this church fully recognize and seize those moments. Stewardship Sunday is a time to step up and say, "Yes. Yes, I love this church. Yes, I want to help when I can."


COMMUNICATIONS

COMMITTEE

The purpose of this committee is to support the church's communications among the membership and beyond. The committee employs the vehicles of communication such as the newsletter, the website, and other forms of social media. Gary Kohunsky is the moderator of this committee and responded to these questions:

Q: Why do you think we need a communications committee?

A. Little Chapel needs governance, structure, and organization to fulfill its mission. To that end, our members and visitors follow a routine established by the church, and we communicate what that looks like through emails, voicemails, bulletins, announcements, the website, newsletter, and even our narthex kiosk.



Our church is in constant motion with something going on all the time – either within the walls or out in the community and beyond. It can be difficult to know the necessary who, what, when, where, why and how without some form of communication and that's where this committee fits in.

We announce upcoming events for planning and scheduling purposes. Afterwards, we document those activities, services, and special events through words and pictures.

I think we crave communications more than we realize. We are conditioned to 'want to know.'

Q. Explain the purpose of the newsletter.

A. In keeping with the response to the first question, I think the newsletter is prepared monthly to announce and promote what's coming up. It also serves as a 'look back' at the same time.

The newsletter tries to incorporate past, present, and future write-ups in each issue.

The newsletter is emailed so those who receive it in that fashion can read it or download and print it. It can also be accessed via our website. Copies of the newsletter are provided in the narthex each month.

I think the newsletter also serves as a history of the life of the church. The 12 issues each year serve as a yearbook. Where else but the newsletter are we documenting the past?



I also believe that the newsletter is the thread that ties all the church committees together. The newsletter receives articles and sometimes pictures from Worship, CE, the Session, Congregational Life, Presbyterian Women, Church Women United, our outreach programs and missions, Matthew house, PKC, PYC, etc. Where else would we get all that information and news but in the newsletter?

Q. So you don't write the articles?

A. I receive the kudos and compliments, but the real credit belongs to those who take the time to submit their articles, pictures, and announcements. They provide the real substance, I just assemble everything, try to make it look pretty – and readable – and then Delores e-mails it out and prints copies.

Q. Before we move on to other topics relating to Communications, any other thoughts about the newsletter?

A. I think the newsletter can be improved. I welcome articles, devotions, prayers, photos...anything anyone would wish to contribute. I can't attend all committee meetings and church functions, but it would be great if we

had something to put in the newsletter that covered those events and meetings.

I also would welcome feedback and suggestions for improvement. I have a Little Chapel mailbox and my email address is gwkohun@yahoo.com. Let me know what you like and what you don't like.

Q. Tell us about the Little Chapel website.



A. The most important thing I can begin with is the this: www.littlechapel.org. The website is a 'real-time' vehicle of communication for Little Chapel. It is a means for announcements and events. For instance, the weekly bulletin and announcements can be viewed before Sunday worship. The 10:30 worship service is recorded, and the audio playback is usually available by Sunday afternoon for anyone who missed the service, wants to listen to it again, or for visitors. The website can be accessed anytime and from anywhere.

I think visitors to our area who may be looking for a church to attend any Sunday, may find our site and then attend a worship service. I find this is especially true in the summer months when we hold our early morning services on the beach. The site gives the information about where and when – even what to bring (beach chair, towel or blanket), where to park (Access #4).

Q. What else does the website offer?

A. There are tabs at the top of the homepage that provide access to information according to subject. Anyone accessing the site can find out about when we worship or information about our staff, Matthew House, our ministries and more. The website is updated frequently and attempts to be as current as possible.

Q. The data received from website usage is very interesting. Can you explain?

A. Basically, I receive data about the number of different people (called unique visitors in website terminology), the number of pages (tabs) viewed along with the average number per visit, and finally, what pages are accessed most. I can get data on a daily, weekly, or monthly basis.


Over the past 30 days, our website has been viewed by 331 unique visitors who looked at 914 pages for a 2.6-page average. The homepage is the page viewed most often with 271 views, and that makes sense since that's what opens up when you access www.littlechapel.org.

After that were these (the number of views in parentheses over the last 30 days):

The Matthew House (69), Worship Services (66), Our Staff (39), the audio recording of the 10:30 service (33), and then Newsletters (23).

Q. If someone would like to join the committee, how do they get started?

A. Anyone who has an interest, a skill or talent, or a desire to learn, is welcome. No experience or special skills are required. New people come with new and fresh ideas, different ways of looking at things, and maybe a different and creative way of communicating. Please contact me at 352-7579 or at gwkohun@yahoo.com.

For more years than most of us can count, members of LCOB have prepared and delivered *Meals on Wheels* on Christmas morning to neighbors in need, before celebrating with their own families and neighbors. This mission of our church is rewarding both to the givers and recipients, but the Little Chapel with the Big Heart goes a step further. We see to it that every meal is delivered with a lovingly wrapped shoebox, filled with small sundries and treats.
